FARM CALENDAR  
Timely Reminders from  
The Pennsylvania State College

Test the "Mercury"—Many poor hatches are the result of failure to test the incubator thermometer. The thermometers should be tested every year before hatching is started. It is a simple job and one that pays a handsome revenue. The thermometer should be immersed in warm water and compared with a good clinical thermometer. If the incubator thermometer fails to agree with the standard thermometer, marks can be made on its surface to indicate the desired change in reading.

Observe Four Rules—Four of the most important points in planting trees and shrubs, say specialists of the Pennsylvania State College, are: (1) Have the location properly prepared with a good soil. (2) Do not plant too deeply. (3) Pack the earth carefully around the roots. (4) Water well in order to fill up the soil cavities.

Grow Salads in Garden—Include a variety of salads in the garden this year. Order seeds of upland cress, corn salad and lettuce for spring use. Heat-resistant varieties of lettuce for summer; Witloof chicory to seed June 1 for supplying forced winter salads; and endive, Chinese cabbage, and lettuce for fall use.

Resists Out Rust—Richland, a new oat variety tried in Pennsylvania for the past two years, has demonstrated resistance to black stem rust. It is especially recommended for those counties where the disease inflicts severe losses.

Test Seed Corn—It would be a blessing if all seed corn were always good. A test in time may save nine or more disappointments; probably more. Know your seed corn and what it will do when put in the ground.

Cows Heart Pumps 21,600  
Gallons of Blood Every Day



MORE than 21,000 gallons of blood—enough to fill a tank 14 feet square and 14 feet high—are pumped through the average cow's heart in twenty-four hours, according to the Larrowe Institute of Animal Economics. Twenty to forty seconds are required for the blood to make a complete circuit of the main circulatory system.

The railroad engine deriving its power from the coal burned in its furnace, transforms the fuel into mechanical energy, but the dairy cow not only derives all her power from the grain, hay and grass she consumes, but, further, turns these materials into blood and milk, which is made of blood. A cow does not perform miracles, and her "milk factory" will not produce abundantly unless she herself is fed plentifully on a tested grain ration, good hay and silage. This is the only sure and safe method as yet discovered by scientists to keep the milk pail filled month after month.
