DEATHS.

GREGG.—Mrs. Mary Alice Gregg, widow of James Potter Gregg, died at the home of her son, Howard J. Gregg, Lewistown, aged 71 years, 5 months and 6 days. She was seriously ill about two months and confined to her bed six weeks prior to her death. She was a patient at Lewistown Hospital two weeks and left that institution a little more than two weeks ago. Gangrene from diabetes which diseased her right foot and back caused her illness and death.

Mrs. Gregg's maiden name was Miss Mary Alice Alkey, of Bellefonte. Her husband, James Potter Gregg, a Civil War veteran, preceded her in death December 10, 1915.

Mrs. Gregg leaves three sons and three daughters: Howard James Gregg, Lewistown; Fred Douglass Gregg, Berwick; William Harrison Gregg, Lewistown; Mrs. Benjamin (Bessie) Graddon, Flemington; Mrs. Joseph (Martha) McIlvaine, Hollywood, and Mrs. Vincent (Julia) McMenahan, Lewistown, R. D. 4.

Mrs. Gregg was a member of the Episcopal church, Bellefonte, all her life. For the last ten years she has had her home most of the time with her son, Howard, in Lewistown.

JOHNSON.—David Crawford Johnson was born at Weikert, June 10, 1856, and died at the Geisinger hospital, aged 69 years, 10 months and 7 days. His death cast a gloom over the entire county where he was so well and favorably known. He was the son of William and Catharine Sweitzer Johnson. He was educated in the public schools of Hartley township, finishing his education at Central Penna. College, formerly located at New Berlin. He taught school for ten years, and was school director for twenty years. He was engaged in the mercantile business practically all his life, at Weikert until several weeks before his death. He was a director of the Laurelton State Bank since its origin. Mr. Johnson's first wife was Hannah Mary Welkel, who died a number of years ago. To this union the following children survive: Jay Edilson, minister and lecturer, of Illinois; Maud, of Avon; L. Ray, assistant supervisor of Danville State Hospital; Harold B., a prominent lawyer of Indianapolis, Ind.; Arthur F., a newspaperman of Indianapolis; Grace M., an instructor in the public schools of Bellefonte, and Ernest D., of Laurelton. His second wife was Mary Ely, who with one son, Walter C., survives. Two brothers, William, of Weikert, Alanson, of Laurelton, and one sister, Mrs. Arminia Blankenship, of Huntingdon, Va., survive. He was an uncle of Federal Judge A. W. Johnson, of Lewisburg. Mr. Johnson was well known in Penna. Valley.

WOLF.—Gus Wolf died in Bellefonte Saturday evening, after a brief illness. He was aged about seventy years. He lived in Centre Hall many years ago, where his wife, who before marriage as Miss Mary Nearhood, died. From here he went to Bellefonte where he has since lived, following the occupation of a laborer.

GLANTZ.—William Gideon Glantz was born at Tyersville, March 28, 1847, and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Wm. D. Breen, at Millheim, aged 79 years, 23 days.

He was a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Glantz, of Tyersville. He was married twice: first to Julia Ziegler, who preceded him to the grave by twenty-nine years, and the second time to Mary Guisewite, who died six years ago.

To the first union the following children are surviving: Mrs. Wm. D. Breen, Millheim, and Mrs. Frank Long

of Madisonburg; ten grandchildren and six great grandchildren. Three brothers, Jonathan, of Sinnemahoning; Samuel, of Tyersville; Daniel, of Greenburr, and two sisters, Mrs. G. C. Holtman, Tyersville, and Mrs. Henry Noll, Axemann, also survive. Interment was made in Yearick's cemetery west of Madisonburg.

MEYER.—John P. Meyer died at the home of Wm. Stauffer, one mile west of Madisonburg, Sunday morning, aged 81 years, 3 months, 17 days. The body was interred at Madisonburg, where services were conducted by Rev. I. N. Baker of the Evangelical church, on Tuesday.

Mr. Meyer was born in Linden, Germany, and came to America many years ago. He was a tourist, clock tinker and traveled over a large section of country. At one time he was credited with having accumulated some money, but bad investments left him penniless at old age. Miles township cared for him during his latter years.

STRONG.—Mrs. William Strong died in a Harrisburg State institution Saturday. The body was shipped to Centre Hall for the undertaking parlor of F. V. Goodhart, from which burial was made Tuesday in the cemetery near Tusseyville. She was a daughter of the late Michael Confer.

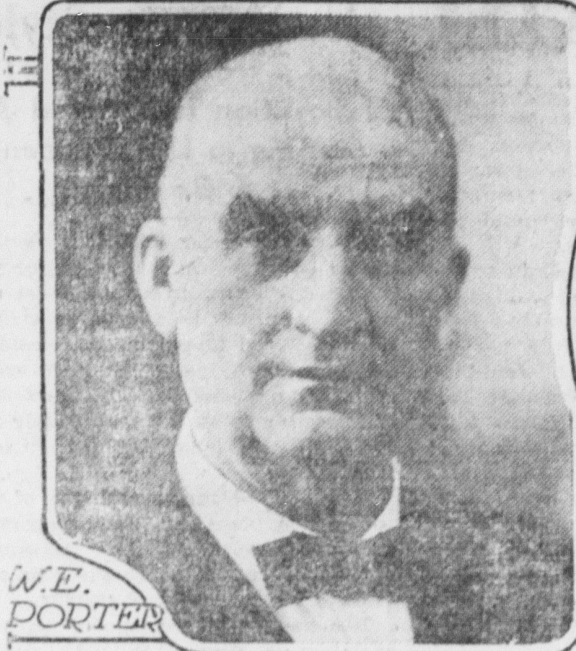
PENNS STATE GRANGE TO STAGE HISTORICAL DRAMA

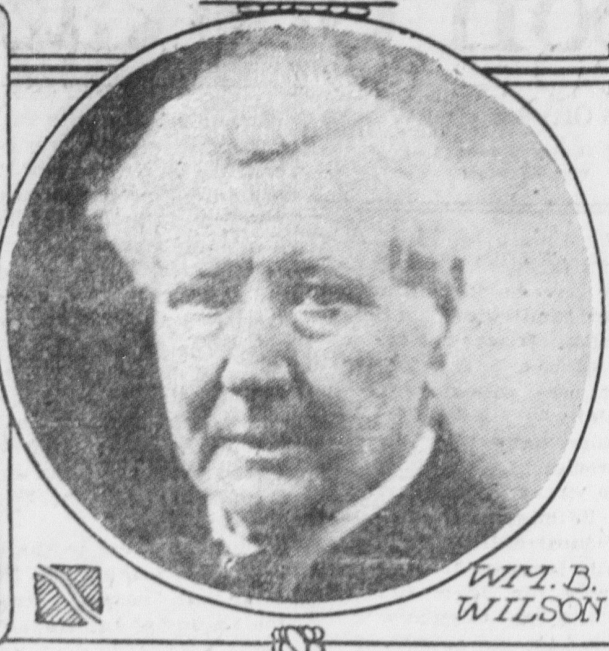

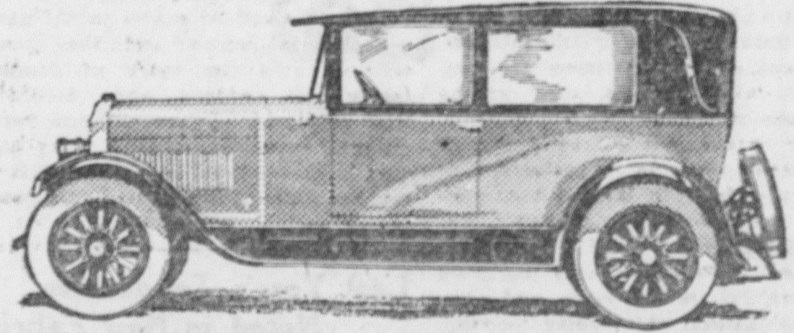
