My dear Doctor Foster: The report has come to me that pre-election lies are being circulated in Centre county concerning the road from State College to Waddle. This road will, by the passage of the Omnibus Road Bill in the last regular session of the Legislature, automatically become a State road on June 1st, and will at that time pass under the care and superintendence of the State. Nothing can prevent it from doing so, and nothing can prevent the State from taking it over at that time. Any suggestion that the action of any politician is necessary to bring this about is the purest rot. You are authorized to deny it in my name. Men who will undertake to get credit for doing things which the Legislature has already settled beyond the possibility of reversal must have reached a pretty low level of political chicanery.
