BOYS GET SEED CORN

Will Cultivate Acre of Special Brand; Divide With Chum Next Year—Seek to Start Better Grade Here.

One of the many projects in the development of better agriculture in Centre county by the High school boys, is a seed corn improvement project to be carried out by thirty boys in different parts of the county, under the direction and instruction of J. B. Payne, Vocational Supervisor.

Each of the thirty boys will be given ten pounds of Clarage seed, a variety that has given unusually good yields at the Pennsylvania State College, and in Mifflin county. It is a corn that is adapted to Centre county conditions, maturing in about 110 days. The boys will select the corn in the fall, store it, and germinate it for seed to be sold in their local sections the next Spring. It is hoped that the outcome will mean more corn to the acre and a better grade of corn for Centre county.

The Associated Business Men of Bellefonte are financing and sponsoring the thirty boys.

There are over 100 students from the high schools of the county who are at present engaged in some form of practical farm project. They are taking poultry, vegetable gardening, potatoes, swine and corn.

The most approved methods are used in conducting their home projects. A record book is kept on all labor, finance, etc., put on the undertaking. The produce from the projects form the bulk of the school fairs and farm products shows held in the fall.

FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

Culls Are Coming.—It will soon be time to remove the antiques from the laying flock. After the flush of production is over, many of the poor birds will stop laying and start to molt. The poultryman who makes the most money "swats" these as fast as they appear. At least half of the flock ought to be discharged each year.

Attend Farmers' Day.—Friday, June 18, is Farmers' Field Day at the Pennsylvania State College. If you have never attended one of these affairs you have missed many treats. Come and bring your neighbor, too.

Break Seed Stalks.—At this time of the year the seed stalks of rhubarb are starting to develop. To throw the strength of the plant into leaf and root development, these should be broken out as fast as they appear. There is so little value to rhubarb seed as a means of propagation of the plant, since from the seed of one plant you may get a dozen different types of rhubarb.

Feed Calves Well.—Dairy calves should be carefully and liberally fed. Well-fed calves develop into large and more efficient cows than do those which are stunted when young. If doubtful as to methods in feeding get a bulletin on the subject from the county agricultural agent.

Tilling Helps Tilth.—Recent reports show only 65 per cent of the spring plowing done by the first of this month compared to 78 per cent last year. The drainage of the wet spots permits early plowing. It helps tith and rushes the spring season.
