Speeding Cut Sunday.

Two cops, uniformed from shoes up with polished badges, stood on the streets on Sunday, and consequently the "pinching" dropped to a very low percentage compared to that of the Sunday previous when the men with stop watches were in citizens' clothes and secluded. This is the first honest effort ever made here on the part of the officials to induce auto drivers to reduce speed in the borough. Except for a single incident occurring Sunday morning the means of the attempt and accomplishing of the checking of fast driving cannot be complained of. The thing referred to is the removal by the cops of signs erected outside the borough notifying autoists to go slow because of a speed trap. The removal of such a sign, and especially if it was located outside the borough, as reported, leaves a bad odor in the wake of the councilman or councilmen who ordered it, for it must be presumed the cops would not act in such a case without definite instructions.

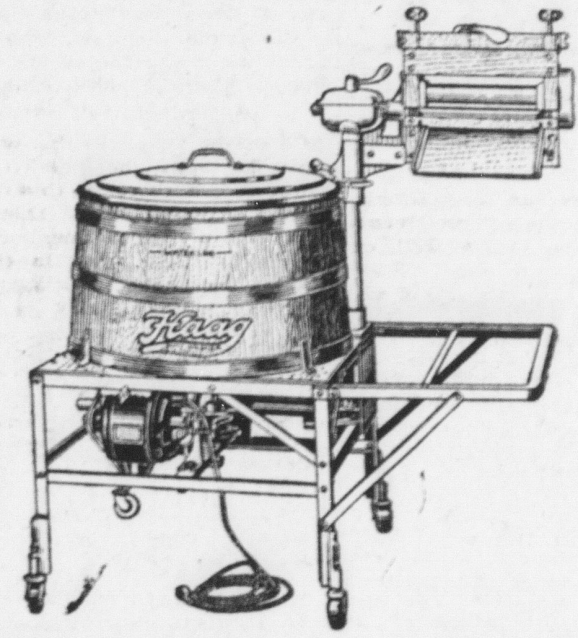
