MAKING NEW ARMS

IF IT is true, as a philosopher sald, that "he is a benefactor to mankind who makes two blades of grass grow where one grew before," what shall we say of a surgeon who makes two arms grow on a crippled boy where none grew before?

One of the strange and inexplicable freaks of nature is the occasional birth of children with no arms. What causes these rare deformities no one knows. Popular belief is that they are due to parental impression; that the mother, a few months before the birth of the child, has had some strange and startling experience. But usually the explanation is found after the child's birth and is changed to match the deformity.

In the case of a Chicago boy, while the explanation was insufficient, there was no question about the deformity. The unfortunate baby was born with out any arms and even without any signs of arms. Yet at the age of twelve he was an unusually bright boy and, strange to say, had shown marked ability in drawing. How could he draw? He learned to hold a pencil between his right cheek and shoulder. He could not only draw but write. He learned to hold a scroll saw with his right foot and so saw out wooden toys. Holding a stick between his cheek and shoulder and hitting the keys with the stick, he became an expert typist. Certainly, such a boy deserved help.

His principal grievance was that he had no sleeves in his shirt and coat. He wanted arms like other boys.

At twelve he was carefully examined by a surgeon who found no signs, externally, of even rudimentary arms. But the X-ray showed on each side, buried under the skin, a small piece of bone only about three Inches long. all there was of the arm bones. On these as a foundation the surgeon began to make him new arms

The fragments of bone were freed from the skin, except at the upper end. The muscles were loosened and wrapped around the little bones and the whole covered with skin flaps. stumps were exercised and the mus- sion workers. SUMMER CAMPS

THE eight years since the war and especially the last five years have seen a tremendous development of the summer camp idea. How much of this was due to the experience of 4,000,000 men in the training camps during 1917 and 1918 it is impossible to say. But it is certain that thousands of young men, dwellers all their lives in houses, found the outdoor life of the training camps not only more healthful but also far more enjoyable than any they had ever known.

Another probable factor in developing a fondness for outdoor life has been the automobile, which has taken millions outdoors and has given them a taste for the joys and benefits of camping out.

A third factor has been the work of anti-tuberculosis associations, which have urged outdoor camps not only in the summer but all the year round, as the best and surest way of recovering from tuberculosis or consumption, which is essentially a house disease,

But besides all these reasons, summer camps for boys and girls have developed a remarkable popularity, not as a means of curing disease but as a definite way of preventing it. For the growing child who spends eight or nine months in the school room, there is nothing so beneficial or which aids so much in the health, growth and development of the child as two months out of doors in the woods, where, under trained instructors, the child can learn not book knowledge but practical subjects, such as swimming, diving, canoeing, nature study of birds, trees, flowers and animals and can come home in the fall brown, strong and healthy, ready for the next win-

ter's school work. The present-day school system, whether public or private, has a gap from the time school closes in the spring until the time when it opens in the fall. To many parents this is a period of worry and anxiety. Many fathers and mothers today are too busy to give much attention to their children during the summer. The result is that for two or three months the child is left practically without any supervision. The summer camps fill this gap. The child for two months is kept busy and happy, its health and diet are cared for by experts, it learns many things it could never learn at school and it comes home in the fall stronger, healthier and happier than it was in the spring.

Steady Increase in Pure Breds

"Better Sires-Better Stock" Campaign Shows Increase in Members.

One hundred and fifty new members a month is the average number of livestock owners joining the "Better Sires-Better Stock" campaign fostered by the bureau of animal industry, United States Department of Agriculture. The members have adopted the use of pure-bred sires for all kinds of live stock on their farms, including poultry. This increase in membership is believed to be a good index of progress in live stock improvement in this

During the three months, January 1 to March 31, as shown by the report uct." just issued by the bureau of animal industry, 450 live-stock owners signed themselves with the better-live-stock movement and bringing the total number of persons so enrolled to 16,560. Persons participating in this work reliterature on animal breeding and feeding and also a lithographed sign, "Pure-Bred Sires Exclusively Used on This Farm." Many other agencies, also, are at work striving toward the same goal, but in most cases their influence is not so easy to measure.

Leading Counties. Plan for Success With

Caponizing Operation To be successful with capons and caponizing, it is absolutely necessary to keep the chicks free from vermin. Chicks infested by mites will not withstand the shock of the operation, while

a vigorous chick will scarcely notice it. While caponizing may be done successfully almost any time of the year, May and June are the better months for it. These, with proper care, should make eight or ten-pound capons by the holiday season. The later ones must be kept over till the latter part of the winter or early spring.

The correct weights for caponizing depend upon the breed-the Mediterraneans at about one pound, the American breeds at from one and threequarter to two pounds, the Asiatics and English from two and a half to three pounds.

The chicks must be kept without feed or water for 24 or 30 hours before the operation. This makes the operation more successful and is better for the birds.

Advise Shippers to Candle Market Eggs

Candle all eggs before shipment, and especially during the warm spring and summer months when spoilage is most likely to occur," is the advice given to egg shippers by the bureau of chemenforcement of the federal food and drugs act. "The loss resulting from spollage of eggs shipped to distant markets may be greatly reduced by this precaution," say the officials. Candling as near as possible to the source of production will not only save transportation charges but will prevent waste of a valuable food prod-

enrollment blanks, thus affiliating terstate shipments of adulterated eggs which have volks stuck to the rots, addled eggs, and any other eggs ceive from the department educational that are filthy, decomposed or putrid are adulterated. When such shipments are found they may be seized and the individuals responsible for shipment prosecuted under the law.

Many eggs that are suitable for imnediate consumption will not stand shipment to distant markets. By candling, these eggs may be taken out and sold for local consumption, leaving only those that have a good chance to reach the market in edible condi-

Wide Variations in the

Cost of Producing Pork Wide variations in the cost of producing pork are shown in a survey made by the Department of Agricul-

ture of farms in Henry county, Iowa, and Warren county, Illinois, said to be typical of corn-hog farms throughout the corn belt. The gross cost of producing 100

pounds of marketable pork on 44 farms in one year ranged from \$3.07 to \$13.55, with an average of \$5.49. Production costs on 39 farms in another year ranged from \$4.86 to \$10 .-02, with an average of \$6.32. The figures are for the years 1921 and 1922 and are presented merely as

The variation, the department says, indicates the influences of care and management in the hog lot. The farms were within a short distance of each other; it was possible to follow very similar methods within the region, and yet some farms shipped hogs to market costing more than twice what they cost other farms

Detailed results of the survey have been published in Department Bulletin No. 1381, "Cost of Producing Hogs in Iowa and Illinois," copies of which may be had free, as long as the supply lasts, upon request to the Department of Agriculture, Washington,

Sudan Grass Found Best

Emergency Crop for Hay

At the Iowa experiment station sudan grass has proved to be the best nonleguminous emergency hay and pasture crop. It may be seeded after corn planting, as it is very drought resistant. About 15 to 20 pounds of seed per acre sowed broadcast or drilled is the general practice. The seedbed is prepared as for corn. If a seed crop is wanted, drill in rows wide enough to permit of cultivation and use 5 to 10 pounds of seed. The crop is not available for pasture until about July 1 and ceases to be productive after the first frost, There is no advantage in seeding be-

July 26. Two cuttings gave higher yields of hay of better quality but there was great difficulty experienced in drying it. The better way is to cut when the seed is in the soft, dough stage and pasture the aftermath. Cut with a mower and cure in the swath. A binder may be used successfully when only one hay crop is made. Scours in Lambs Caused Usually by Carelessness

Experience has caused many breeders to believe that scours in lambs, like the sore eye trouble, is generally the result of carelessness, Heavy feeding of grain, soon after lambing, may cause scours, but the main trouble is caused by failure to keep the ewe's udder milked clean while the lamb is small, too small to use all the milk.
