Electrocuted Monday.

Angelo Cicero, of Westmoreland county, convicted of slaying Earl Shoup, of Snyderstown, on July 4, 1922, was electrocuted Monday morning, 7:02 o'clock, at the Rockview penitentiary. He made no statement.

Cicero's first trial resulted in a conviction, but a new trial was awarded by the supreme court on a technicality. The second trial resulted in conviction and Cicero was sentenced to die in the electric chair June 29, 1925. Just as Cicero was about to enter the death house at the penitentiary, however, word was received from Harrisburg that a respite had been granted and Cicero was taken to Bellefonte and given a hearty meal by Sheriff Fichtner.

Although six respite were granted and Cicero's case was before the board of pardons three times before the sentence was finally confirmed and the execution set for Monday.
