DEATHS

EVERETT—Mary Jane Everett, relict of Jacob Everett, deceased, of Coburn, died after a week's illness of heart trouble.

Deceased was a daughter of Samuel and Amelia Dennis and was born at Laurelton. Her age at death was 63 years, 7 months and 14 days.
She was married on August 11, 1878 to Jacob Everett, of Coburn, who departed this life about six years ago. To this union was born one son, Arthur R. Everett, a mail carrier of Bellefonte, who survives with a brother, Lewis K. Dennis, of Pierre, S. D., and a sister, Mrs. Hazel, of Unionville.

DUNKLE—Thomas J. Dunkle, who served as sheriff of Centre county from January, 1882, to January, 1883, died at his home in Punxsutawney. He was born in Walker township and was seventy-eight years old. He was elected sheriff in the fall of 1881 and served for three years. At the expiration of his term he embarked in the grocery business in Bellefonte but the venture not proving a success he sold out and moved to Punxsutawney. He married Miss Elizabeth Fortney, of Potter township, who survives with a number of children. Burial was made at Punxsutawney.

Three Youths Arrested.

Russell Grabbill, 21, and James Tulley, 22, of Lewistown, and William Sholly, 19, of Lebanon, who confessed to the burglary of the H. and H. Supply Company, Lewistown, where they obtained \$500, according to the check-up of the company, were arrested in Lewistown on Tuesday. Tulley, who is alleged to have entered first and secured the cash, divided only \$250 with his companions. This was July 13. On July 26 they forced an entrance to the office of the Mt. Rock Milling company, where they obtained nothing, but at 3 o'clock in the morning, the same date, they entered the Adler store, Lewistown, with a master key, and secured \$550, according to the check of the Adler people. Tulley entered and took charge of the cash, dividing only \$36 with his companions.

Scouts Buy Nevel Farm.

The Boy Scout organization at State College purchased the Nevel farm, above Colyer, for a permanent camp. The consideration is said to be \$3900. The tract contains considerable acreage, mostly mountain land. Sinking creek, which has its head in Bear Meadows, also flows through the tract. The property was known for many years as the Peter Kerlin property.

New Water Pump.

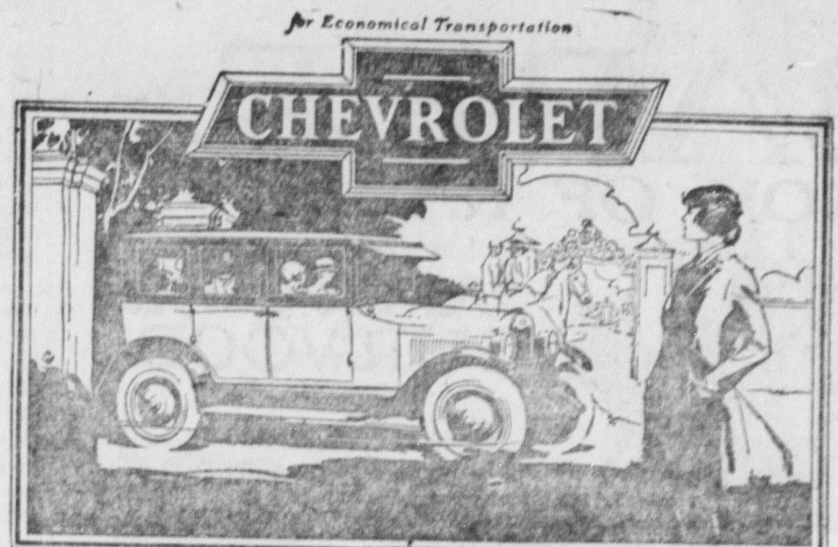
A new water pumping outfit is being installed at the borough reservoir, which in all probability will solve to at least a very large extent the water question for the present. The new outfit is generally known as a compression pump, the water being lifted by forcing air to the bottom of the well through a pipe, which pipe is the center or core of a second pipe of larger diameter. Both pipes are open at the bottom of the well. The water is forced upward through the space between the two pipes by the air forced down through the smaller pipe. If this is a real outfit and not a toy like the present pump in use, we may expect splendid results.
At the time the council was about to purchase the watertight from the Centre Hall Water company, some members of the council advocated the installing of the pumping system now about to be installed instead of buying something that was then known to be of no service or could be made serviceable. Although the purchase of a compression pump was strongly advocated by some councilmen, citizens and this paper, the old water plant was purchased at a cost of about \$3000. To date it has not been utilized and cannot be successfully utilized.

Later the council took measures to build a reservoir at the old plant, but objections to spending more money uselessly were so strongly voiced that the reservoir proposition was dropped. In the meantime the toy pump did its best, and today there is on the ground a pumping system like that advocated prior to the purchase of the old water plant. The obsession to dominion at any cost seems to have passed for the moment.
