Sheep Decreasing in Penna.

During the year 1920 Pennsylvania  
had a total of 1,776,588 sheep, 14,547  
of which were found in Centre coun-  
ty. In 1922 the sheep in the State  
numbered but 2,077,000. Centre county  
being credited with 5,479. Approximately  
one-half the sheep in the State are  
found in Washington and Greene  
counties. Merinos being kept almost  
exclusively.
