Auxiliary Electric Plant.
The Mountain Times, published at Howard, has this bit of news: Preparations are being made by the State Centre Electric plant of Howard for the installation of an auxiliary electric plant to be used in emergencies such as have existed during the past month. Balser Weber, manager of the company, has explained. The plant is to be erected at the site of the former iron works along the P. R. R. tracks a short distance east of the tower. The power will be furnished by a large turbine and the generators will be a thoroughly modern plant means will be capable of supplying power for Howard borough and vicinity at times when the power from the main line is cut off for some reason or other. This will make possible a better service.

To the Sesqui by Auto.
The week beginning Monday, September 13th, will be known as Agricultural Week at the Philadelphia Sesqui-Centennial, and through the efforts of the Swine Growers' Association of Centre county a tour is being planned to start from Bellefonte on the 13th to spend several days at the Centennial.

R. C. Blaney, county farm agent, will lead the tour which will organize at the Diamond in Bellefonte at 8:00 o'clock on the morning of September 13th, and proceed by automobiles by way of Centre Hall, Spring Mills, Millheim, Lewisburg, Sunbury, Harrisburg to Norritown. Headquarters during the stay will be made at the Norris Hotel where reservations have been secured at \$1.50 to \$2.50 per night. It is planned to leave the cars in Norritown and proceed either by railroad or electric lines to Philadelphia, a distance of about 14 miles.

New York Population, 5,924,000.
A new population, estimated by the Commerce Department, of the 14 largest cities in the United States, places New York at the head of the list with 5,924,000. The estimated population of the other cities in the order of size follows: Chicago, 3,048,000; Philadelphia, 2,003,000; Detroit, 1,290,000; Cleveland, 969,000; St. Louis, 830,000; Baltimore, 808,000; Boston, 787,000; Pittsburgh, 637,000; Los Angeles, 576,000; San Francisco, 567,000; Buffalo, 544,000; Washington, 528,000; and Milwaukee, 517,000.

Mrs. James Confer and family from Millheim are visiting Mrs. Confer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Smull.


Mr. and Mrs. Granley and two children, from Horseheads, New York, are visiting among relatives.
