PINCHOT'S STATEMENT. "Vare is Not Fit to Represent Pennsylvania." Says the Governor—Quotes Pepper, Mellon, Et. Al.

Governor Pinchot will not support Congressman Vare for the Senate because of his personal unfitness to represent Pennsylvania in the Senate. The Governor, on Monday, incident to his withdrawal as a Labor Party candidate for the United States Senate, issued his first statement regarding his attitude toward the Republican campaign, and while he did not endorse William B. Wilson, Democratic nominee, his words are interpreted as favoring his election.

Coach Properly Defined

Now that the coach has become a large factor in motordom, the question is raised as to what is meant by the term. The Society of Automotive Engineers defined it: "An enclosed single-compartment body, similar in general appearance to the sedan, with two close-coupled cross seats for four passengers. There is a luggage compartment or space for a trunk at the back of the body. There is no glass in the rear quarters. The conventional type has two doors only, the forward seats being divided and the right-hand seat tipping forward to give access to the rear cross seat. Some models have two doors on the right-hand side, there being two fixed cross seats."—Exchange.
