Coach Properly Defined

Now that the ceach has become a large factor in motordom, the question is raised as to what is meant by the term. The Society of Automotive Engineers defined it:

"An inclosed single-compartment body, similar in general appearance to the sedan, with two close-coupled cross seats for four passengers. There is a luggage compartment or space for a trunk at the back of the body. There is no glass in the rear quarters. Razors and Hot Water The bureau of standards says that

" no roal basis for the statement that pouring hot water on a razor blade will injure the steel from which it is made. In general, razors are very hard, and it is possible that in some cases the continued application of boiling water would exert a slight tempering effect, thereby slightly softening the blade; however, in general, it is believed that the influence of hot-water applications would merely "season" hardened steel without iny material change in hardness. The

nature of seasoning by hot water when applied to different steels is not vell understood, but it is questionable whether the cutting edge of the blade s affected at all.

PINCHOT'S STATEMENT.

"Vare Is Not Fit to Represent Pennsylvania," . Says the Governor-Quotes Pepper, Mellon, Et. Al.

Governor Pinchot will not support Congresman Vare for the Senate because of his personal unfitness to represent Pennsylvania in the Senate. The Governor, on Monday, incident to his withdrawal as a Labor Party candidate for the United States Senate issued his first statement regarding his attitude toward the Republican campaign, and while he did not endorse William B. Wilson, Democratic nominee, his words are interpreted as favoring his election. The Governor will take no part in the fall campaign, but as a Republican he will "vote for a majority of Republican candidates.".

"I am a Republican," said the Governor, "but I cannot stand for Vare. He is not fit to represent Pennsylvania in the Senate of the United States.

The statement makes no reference to the Republican nominee for Governor, John S. Fisher, The Governor did not oppose his nomination at the primary and has never assumed the hostile attitude he has taken toward the Philadelphia Congressman. It gives it its bad name was Mr. Fisher who, as a candidate himself four years ago, aided in electing the present Governor by withdrawing from the contest in the pri-

mary. United States Senators Pepper and Reed, W. L. Mellon, Republican State Chairman, and Mr. Fisher are quoted even if he receives the nomination.' by the Governor to prove the unfitness of Vare. Their words were uttered during pre-primary days.
