DEATHS

She was aged 71 years, 9 months and 8 days and was the widow of Emanuel Neese, who died two years previous. She was the only child of David and Mary J. (Wise) Fidler, and was born and reared in Penn township. Two sons, Samuel and Frank A. Neese, four grandchildren and five great-grandchildren survive her.

She was aged 62 years. Mrs. Barner was a member of St. John's Lutheran church. Surviving her are three sons: Charles F., of Bellefonte; Orvis E., of Milwaukee, and Harvey J., Lock Haven; two daughters, Mrs. Elmer Rossman, of Bellefonte; Mrs. Deemer Mihar, of Dover, Minn.; two sisters, Mrs. Charles Stamm, and Mrs. Stella Karstetter, of Loganton; and two brothers, Thomas Gramley, of Altoona, and Wilbur Gramley, of Baltimore, Md. The Barner family at one time lived on a farm near Centre Hall.

KOONEY.—James A. Kooney, of Montandon, died recently in the Geisinger hospital, at Danville, as the result of an operation. He was eighty-two years old and was born in Penn township, this county, where he lived until about twenty years ago when he moved to Montandon. He served during the Civil war as a member of Company D, 148th regiment, under Gen. James A. Beaver. At the battle of Gettysburg he was wounded in the knee and never entirely recovered therefrom. His wife died two years ago but surviving him are two sons and a daughter, J. Elmer Kooney, of Montandon; Wilbur, of Hay, Washington, and Mrs. William Kerstetter, of State College. He also leaves seventeen grandchildren. Burial was made at Montandon.

YEARICK.—P. Gross Yearick died in Philadelphia, Sunday, October 15th, of acute Bright's disease, at the age of 74 years and one month. Services were held at the David H. Schuyler building, on Sunday following his death, and Monday the remains were shipped to Aaronsburg where interment was made.

Mr. Yearick was a son of Thomas Yearick and was born and reared in Aaronsburg. About forty years ago he went to Philadelphia, where for a number of years he was connected with the firm of H. H. Yearick & Brothers, coal dealers, and later with the George B. Newton Coal Co., Franklin Bank building.

He was never married. There survive a brother, H. H. Yearick. He was a frequent visitor to Centre Hall during the life time of Mrs. W. B. Mingie, a sister.

Furnace; Francis R. and Charles Irvin Bottorf, both of State College. He was a member of the Bethlehem Congregational church, of Cleveland, Ohio.

Interment was made at Boalsburg, Rev. J. W. Wagner officiating.

ZETTLE.—M. A. Zettle, a native of Centre county, died at his home in Jersey Shore, following a brief illness. He was 62 years old and was born at Spring Mills. He was a baker by occupation and during his residence in Jersey Shore conducted a bakery up to two years ago, since which time he has been in the mercantile business. He is survived by his wife, four children, two sisters and one brother. Burial was made at Jersey Shore.
