

Shipping Apples.

A few of the local apple growers have been able to dispose of their crops, and are about to ship them at this time. One of the growers is Dr. A. Hooser, who is packing a crop of several hundred bushels into baskets, the varieties being mostly Baldwins and Staymen Winesaps.

Another grower, W. A. Alexander, sold his entire crop to the Oriole Stores. He estimates he will have one thousand bushels, the varieties being largely Baldwins and Staymen Winesaps.

The price obtained for the Apples, exclusive of the package, is around forty cents per bushel. In both cases cited, the sale was made per 100 lbs.

Killed Deer Illegally.
