**New Autumn Hats Have Dash, Charm**

**Designs Offered for Every Occasion; Costume Harmony Stressed.**

That new feminine movement in fashions forecast for two seasons is more evident in millinery than in any other part of the costume, says a fashion writer in the New York Times. Since the mannish mode came in it is the hat which has resisted most stubbornly every suggestion toward more elaborate styles. Women have just loved the little cloche, which, in one variant or another, has for so long persisted as the hat for any occasion. It is even now seen under new names, to be worn as it should be, with sports dress. The bob may to some degree be responsible for its length of life; now that this style of coiffure is no longer a novelty the new types of millinery will have a clearer field. In the opinion of some stylists, the day of the bob is past; in that of others whose judgment is regarded as authoritative, women will continue to wear their hair short until long hair will one day seem quite exceptional. However this may prove to be, the hat with more graceful lines, softer arrangement, intricacy of detail and more trimming has arrived, and it is being interpreted in many delightful designs by the milliners of both France and America.

The occasion hat means now not one style of hat for all occasions, but one for each and every occasion, and that to harmonize with the gown. The tailored hat we shall have, as always, for the street ensemble, but in a more dignified design and in shapes that express distinctive styles and something of picture value. The shapes were among the first to appear in the autumn collections, for they belong with the suits that are worn for cool weather, the between-seasons dress replacing the outmoded summer clothes and anticipating the regular mode for fall and winter.

**More Severe Designs.**  
 These hats are, in some models, a more severe design than we have had in anything except the trimless cloche, but they have more chic and dash. For example, the stiff, high crown directoire shape resembles a man's silk hat and that which a woman wears with her formal riding habit. This shape is amazingly flattering to some women, and now, in panne or beaver, is very handsome. The crown of this shape is seen in a number of hats made of materials that have a softer finish, and with a brim that is less stiff than that of the beaver, though it follows the same general, slightly curving line.

These hats are among the earliest to establish the vogue of two materials, for in most of the models

a crown of felt or cloth has a velvet brim, and vice versa. The trimming is a narrow band of ribbon, a fold of the same or of a different material, a tailored bow of cut cloth, velvet or ribbons, or one of the new snappy cockades that are to be exceedingly fashionable. Some of these little ornaments are made of ribbon—usually grosgrain or moire, but the novelties of the season are the bright colored Tyrolean uprights of feathers. They are small but gay and pretty, and make a point of distinction that adds much to the richness of a hat of cloth or velvet.

The idea is borrowed from jaunty Alpine hats whose wearers are undisturbed by the frequent changes in the styles of headgear. In other tailored shapes the cockades are of different sorts, some of them most intriguing, but the favorite of the season promises to be that of tinted feathers, a quill or cluster of quills. The vagabond is here to stay for a while, with the fall mode in sports dress, and in more rakish shapes than heretofore.

**Tailored or Informal Hat.**  
 All of the prominent milliners are making the tailored, but at least the informal, hat, giving special attention to establishing original designs, as this phase of their art is, like the simplest tailored dress, a real test of creative skill. Among the collections of Camille Roger and Jane Blanchot are some particularly chic berets, most of them in velvet—some with a bandeau of

cloth and crown of velvet, some done in velvet and some satin. Each of these illustrates a new mode of trimming, with an ornamental pin of onyx, jade or chased crystal piercing the slant of the beret. The high crown hats of cloth, and cloth and velvet, are shown with a jeweled ornament—an initial, monogram or figure of some description.

A strikingly smart hat of two-tone green felt is trimmed with three ribbon cockades made of two shades of green grosgrain ribbon. A charming Blanchot hat is a felt in light green, having a band of black crepe ribbon drawn about the crown and through the draped arrangement of the crown and the slit brim at one side. The stiff quality of the ribbon gives the effect of a feather ornament. Another high crown tailored hat is of gray felt and velvet in a darker shade, the grosgrain ribbon trimming being added around the lower edge of the crown. This type of hat, in various shapes, both severe and soft, affords opportunity for the use of many of the new styles in ornamental accessories. They are the fancy feather motifs, cockades, rosettes, quills and small ostrich feathers and feather

flowers, which are most lovely of all. Roses, chrysanthemums, passion flowers, lilies, Rose of Sharon and dahlias are among these clever novelties. They are quite perfect in form, the feathers flawless and the colors beautiful.

**Shapes Cling to Tradition.**  
 Shapes in general are distinctive in type and definitely reflect tradition, as they are presented by the leading designers of millinery. The Agnes turban is plainly inspired by African headresses. The beret is old friend tam o' shanter; the vagabond borrowed from the Paris apache. The Gainsborough and Cavalier shapes are shown in adaptations, influenced by the present mode of dress, skirt length and coiffure.

Ribbons seem logically to belong more to millinery than to any other part of the costume as presented in the fashions of the day. This season's ribbons include many novelties and a tendency to richness of quality. Some among the new hats are made entirely of ribbon, somewhat after the manner of the summer styles, but of ribbon in velvet, heavy satin, grosgrain and metal. Grosgrain is the most in demand among the novelties. There is a heavy double-faced satin ribbon for plain hats. In the wider ribbons are three-tones in delicate colors and two-tones in the double-faced ribbons.

The new weaves in moire have a fine high luster and one of the hand-somest of the metal ribbons is multi-colored, in cubist pattern. In ribbons, too, the reptile pattern is reproduced, most effectively in the finer metallic. A ribbon with gold bars is used for handbags and the velvet ribbons in bois de rose, myrtle green, chanel red, beige, wood browns and Roman stripes are being used for trimming both gowns and hats.

Feather flowers are shown not only in the informal shapes, but in the more elaborate hats of velvet and satin. Besides these feather and ribbon trimmings are some interesting novelties shown by exclusive houses in flowers and ornamental motifs, which are made of other materials. Small metal flowers, arranged in stiff, upright nosegays, are used like cockades; and quills and straight wings are metallized in gilt and silver. Large single blossoms are tipped with metal, and graceful sprays are made of metallized flowers and leaves. For the larger shapes, in the dashing style of street hats, there are big plaques and flat ornaments in mixed tones of metal on ostrich. The military coquard in metallized feathers is shown on the extreme hussar shape.

**Lace and Plaits**  
 A combination of hand-drawn lace and plaits of georgette compose the latest lingerie combinations. The plaittings form panels on both the chemise and the panties and the lace edge the borders. Turquoise is a new and favored color, but orchid, light green, yellow and flesh also are exploited.

**Yellow for Gown**  
 A stunning evening gown is of yellow chiffon, trimmed with ostrich feathers shading from a deep yellow to a delicate umber.

**GOOD THINGS WE LIKE**

We in America are coming to know more about the value of mutton and are learning how to appreciate and prepare it. In England it is one of the favorite meats; Scotland has long known its value. One of the first essentials to good-flavored mutton is of course well-fed and cared for animals, then the next is careful butchering. The butcher who skins the animal must use care that his hands which have touched the wool and become oily never touch the meat.

If the cook, when the meat comes from the market to her, will carefully remove all the skin it will take with it every trace of the often objectionable woolly flavor.  
**Saddle of Mutton.**—Wipe the meat carefully, sprinkle with salt and pepper and place on a rack in a dripping pan; dredge the meat and the bottom of the pan with flour. Bake in a hot oven one and one-fourth hours, basting every fifteen minutes. When carving, cut thin slices parallel with the back bone, then slip the knife under and separate the slices from the ribs. Serve with:  
**Currant Mint Sauce.**—Separate into small pieces two-thirds of a glass of currant jelly, but do not heat it. Add one and one-half tablespoons of finely chopped mint leaves and the shavings from the rind of one-fourth of an orange.

**Russian Salad.**—Arrange a bed of lettuce in a salad bowl. Peel four tomatoes of medium size, cut fine and mix with sardines, chopped and skinned. Place on lettuce and serve with French mayonnaise dressing.  
**Almond Bread.**—Make a sponge at night with one quart each of water and gluten flour, add a yeast cake dissolved in a little water and let rise over night. In the morning add two teaspoonsful of salt, one cupful of blanched almonds, finely chopped and enough gluten flour to mold. Knead well, mold into loaves and bake when light. This makes two loaves. Gluten flour may be used most acceptably by those who are not obliged to use it in their diet.

**Practical Good Things.**  
 We are coming to the season when a hot drink after a cool ride will be welcome.  
**Grape Juice and Marshmallow.**—Add the juice of a lemon to a quart of grape juice and let it come to a boil, adding a stick of cinnamon and half a dozen cloves. Strain hot into glasses and add two marshmallows to each glass, cut into quarters. If the grape juice is rich a cupful of water may be added. This is a nice drink for skaters as it can be taken in thermos bottles and kept piping hot.

In spite of the derision which the good old bread pudding has to endure, it is still a favorite in many homes.  
**Bread Pudding.**—Take one and one-half cupfuls of milk, one-half cupful of sugar, two slices of bread buttered, and one egg. Beat the egg and add the sugar; when well mixed add the milk slowly, heating all the time. Place the buttered bread in a baking dish, pour over the milk and egg; the bread will rise to the top of the pudding dish, making a crust. Allow it to stand one hour, then bake in a hot oven long enough to set the custard. Serve with cream and sugar or a hard sauce.

**Ice Box Rolls.**—Take a cake of dry yeast, cover with a cupful of lukewarm water and soak until well softened, then add four tablespoonsful of flour and mix well. Let stand overnight in a warm place. In the morning add another cupful of water, a cupful of sugar and a cupful of shortening—lard is best as it keeps sweet better than other shortening. Mix with enough flour to knead; do not add as much flour as for bread, but enough to handle well. Now place in a bowl and set at once into the ice box. The next morning take out a part of the dough and mold into rolls or buns, as many as are needed. Set to rise in the room temperature and by night they will be ready to bake for the evening meal. If wanted at noon set near the heat to force the rising. There will be enough roll mixture for several bakings and if kept on ice the last will be as light as the first.

**Old-Fashioned Vegetable Soup.**—Get a veal knuckle and have it cracked so that all the marrow will be exposed. Treat a good beef shank in the same way. Place all the bones and meat in a large kettle, cover with cold water and bring to a simmer and let simmer for two or three hours. Now add a carrot sliced, a piece of celery root finely minced, an onion or two, a small turnip cut into dice, and a half cupful of chopped cabbage, then add a few diced potatoes. Cook with a tomato or two cut into bits until all the vegetables are tender, then serve piping hot.
