**S. U. ALUMNI DINNERS.**

Centre District to Meet at Centre Hall Friday Evening—Dinner at Col-dron's Restaurant.

Several thousand Susquehanna University alumni will gather at dinner meetings in twenty-four different Pennsylvania cities on the evening of November 5th, for a discussion of the University's proposed program of development.

The dinner meetings will mark the opening of an effort on the part of the alumni to raise \$125,000 for the construction of an Alumni Memorial Library at the University.

Plans also are being completed for the observance of Susquehanna University Sunday in Lutheran churches of the Susquehanna Synod of Central Pennsylvania on November 7th.

From November 5th to 15th alumni, church members and Snyder county residents will conduct a concerted appeal to raise a total of \$450,000 to carry out the University's program of development. Building at the library, addition of \$200,000 to the productive endowment and payment of a debt of \$125,000 are included in the program.

The Alumni dinner meeting in the Centre District including Centre county, will be held November 5 at 6:30 P. M. in the Col-dron restaurant at Centre Hall.

County Committee to Banquet at Homan Restaurant.

The county committee will banquet at the same time at the Homan restaurant, and after that the banqueters will all meet in the Lutheran church where Dr. F. P. Manhart, Dean of the Theological Seminary, will deliver an address.

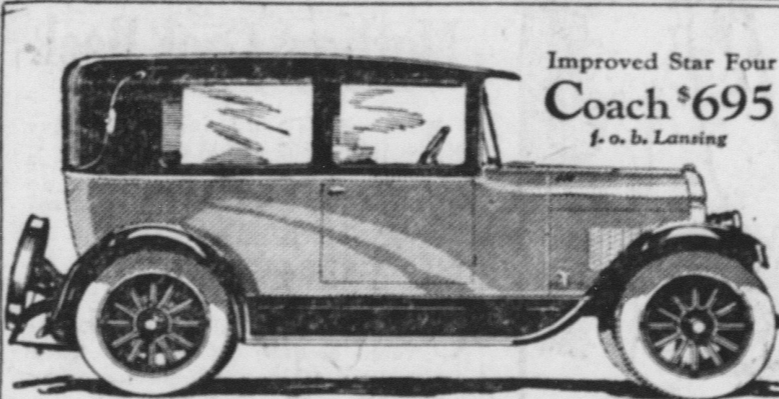
