Many Deer Slaughtered.

Mr. Martin, a Sunbury hunter, while in the mountains after game was accidentally shot through the calf of the leg by a young man from Madisonburg.

Walter R. Hosterman and H. Leigh Ebright, local hunters, each got their buck one day last week. The former was a member of a State College club while the latter hunted with a Thompson town crowd.

The Bradford party, one of the oldest hunting clubs in these diggings, got their limit of six bucks before last Thursday noon. Some of the third generation of Bradfords are members of the hunting club. The hunters successful in killing were Clyde E. Bradford, Ernest H. Homan, Ralph G. Homan, J. Frank Smith, John Meeker, John Dittrow. The camp is located at Pole Bridge, above Colyer.

W. L. Kinsey, a member of the Manor-Centre County Club, is in Decatur Valley again for his annual outing. The camp is made up of gentlemen from Pittsburgh and thereabouts and is the old Hipka place about four miles east of Sunset club house. Mr. Kinsey is chief clerk to assistant train master, P. R. R., at Pittsburgh, and aside from coming to Centre county to hunt big game finds little time to be away from his desk. The camp's success as to killing game is noted elsewhere.

Henry Lamott, of Red Lion, one of the members of the Union Hunting Club, got badly mixed up with a big buck after his backship was on his back as the result of the good marksmanship of Mr. Lamott. The hunter took hold of the buck's large rack to turn his head so that the buck would be in better position for "sticking," when the animal struggled and he and the gamy buck turned over and over down the mountainside, each being on top but half the time. The hunter called to his companions to shoot the deer, calling the game by some name that sounded much like "semofabulousness man," the language of "Shuffle Sam." The Union Hunting Club is located in the school house, remodelled and enlarged, in Boal's Gap. The hunters got the limit during the first three days of the season.

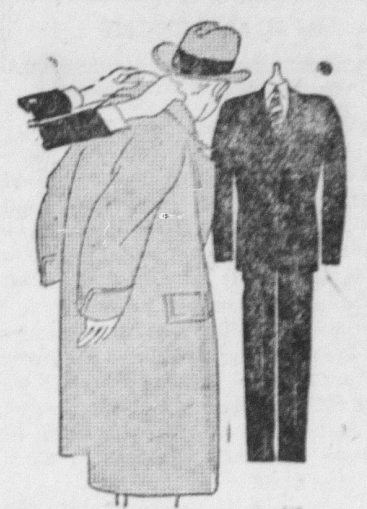

The death of Joseph Campbell, mentioned of which appears under the proper head, recalls to mind an incident back in 1865, that cost the life of Samuel Bair, a Potter township constable. The shooting occurred at Tusseyville. Joseph Campbell and his brother, William Campbell, lived at Black Hawk, then a locality of some distinction, and on their way up foot over Nittany Mountain, became boisterous as they ascended the hill now within the Centre Hall borough confines. Objections were made to their performances by a resident, who had a warrant issued for their arrest. The Campbell boys made efforts to evade arrest, but as they came along the Tusseyville store, Henry Smith, then a merchant there, grabbed Joseph and was able to hold him. Constable Bair was near by and pursued the fleeing William. Through the excitement, some one shouted, "Shoot!" when Campbell drew his gun and throwing his hand over his shoulder, fired. The bullet hit the constable and killed him. Campbell was sentenced to about three years in the penitentiary, a jury having declared him guilty of manslaughter.
