Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

Classes for All Poultry Keepers—The State Egg Show to be held at the time of the State Farm Products Show at Harrisburg provides classes for boys and girls between the ages of 16 and 20 years; for backward poultrymen living in villages, towns and cities; for farmers who keep less than 500 birds, and for farmers, hatcheries, and commercial poultrymen with 500 or more birds. Premium lists and entry blanks are obtainable from the local county agent, located at the county seat; the Poultry Extension Department, State College, Pa., or the Department of Agriculture, Harrisburg, Penna.

Imported Seed Is Stained—Imported alfalfa and clover seed must be stained to comply with the seed laws. Be sure the foreign seed you buy is adaptable to your conditions. If it is stained red, green, or violet there is a reason.

Sows Need Exercise—To help the

sow maintain her health and vigor during the winter and to aid her to farrow thrift, healthy, vigorous pigs in the spring, it is necessary to force her to take exercise. Lying around the nests is a poor substitute for exercise. Put the nest in one spot and the feed and water some distance away, so she will have to walk for her meals.

May Confer Degrees.
Central State Normal School, at Lock Haven, has been granted authority by the State council of education to confer degrees in education.

Dr. Armstrong, the principal, explained that it will be possible for students to receive their Normal school certificates and Normal school diplomas as usual after completing the required two years' work; the last two years required for the bachelor's degree may be taken immediately after completing the two years' course, or, if necessary, may be taken after the student has been teaching for a year

or two. This arrangement, he pointed out, makes it possible for any one desiring the degree in education to obtain one.

Dr. Armstrong expressed the gratification of the faculty and students at the new honor that has come to the school and added that the assistance of Lock Haven citizens and of the alumni of the school in general has been very helpful in securing this recognition.
