DEATHS.

REBER—John F. Reber, a well known business man of Lewisburg, died at the Gelsinger hospital, Mr. Reber was well known in Centre Hall, having installed a number of heating plants here during the past few years. When a youth he was employed by C. Dressbaugh's Sons, in Lewisburg, and continued there until 1902, when he and John Fisher opened a hardware and plumbing establishment. About four years ago the hardware feature of the business was sold and Mr. Reber continued in the plumbing business. He was aged fifty-seven years. He had been in poor health for some time and for seven weeks was confined to bed. Interment was made in Lewisburg cemetery, after services in the Lutheran church of which church he was long a member.
On December 18, 1890, he was married to Ella N. Gearhart, of Millington, Juniata county. Surviving Mr. Reber are his wife and one daughter, Mrs. W. J. Busser, of Kingston.

HUNTER—Mrs. Sarah C. Hunter, of McVeytown, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Charles Cox, of Juniata, after a brief illness. Mrs. Hunter had not been well for several weeks and on Thanksgiving day her son William, with whom she lived, drove her to the home of her daughter in Juniata, where she gradually grew weaker until the end came.
Mrs. Hunter was the daughter of Edward and Rebecca Kramer, and was born in Milesburg, August 24, 1850. She was a member of the First Methodist church of Juniata. The funeral services were held from the home of her daughter and the interment made at Bealsburg. She leaves the following sons and daughters: F. R. Hunter, of New Castle; R. K. Hunter, of Crafton; J. G. Hunter, of California; W. E. Hunter, of McVeytown; Mrs. M. R. Myers, of New Castle; R. K. Hunter, of State College; A. H. Hunter, of Sarsina, Kansas; T. V. Hunter, of Dormont; Mrs. Sarah Cox, of Juniata; and Mrs. E. J. Taylor, of Altoona. She is also survived by 33 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren, and one brother, Andrew Kramer, of Altoona, and one sister, Mrs. M. J. Kennedy, of Morton.

GROVE—John W. Grove, a highly respected farmer residing in the vicinity of the Rockview penitentiary, expired suddenly from a heart attack. He was born on the farm upon which he died and was aged 64 years last July. His parents were Daniel and Lea M. Grove. His mother died in January, 1925, while his father passed away several years ago. Surviving are his wife, Susan A. Grove, and these children: George W., of near Bellefonte; Ella R., Vienna L., John E., Martin L. and Homer I., all at home. These sisters and brothers also survive: Mrs. Alice C. Collins, of Pittsburg; Mrs. Lydia H. Rockett, of Bealsburg; Lea Grove, of Bellefonte; Franklin C., of Bellefonte; and Ham, of Buffalo Run. Funeral services were held at the Lutheran church at Shiloh, in charge of Rev. C. E. Arnold, of Bellefonte. Interment in the Shiloh cemetery.
