The cancelling machine shows that a total of 1,895,833 pieces had been run through it. C. O. D. packages to the value of \$58,156 were delivered to customers. This item does not enter into the gross receipts.

From the Philadelphia Journal it is learned that the club members are asked to lay down \$15.00 each for expenses. At this rate the credentials of a Democrat will be accepted.

Fred Stover, tenant on the Harper farm, east of Centre Hall, recently sold to James Decker, will follow C. W. Slack when the latter moves back to Centre Hall about April 1st. Mr. Decker will till both the Harper farm and the farm he now lives on. When F. V. Jodon vacates the Bartholomew farm, west of Centre Hall, he will be followed by Daniel Bloom as tenant. The latter is a beginner as a farm tenant.

By April 1st, he expects to occupy a part of the McCool double house when it is vacated by Mr. and Mrs. J. H. McCool, who have planned to move into one of their farm houses, south of Centre Hall. Mr. Harter is a mechanic and is employed at the Titan works, near Bellefonte. He came here from the eastern part of the State.

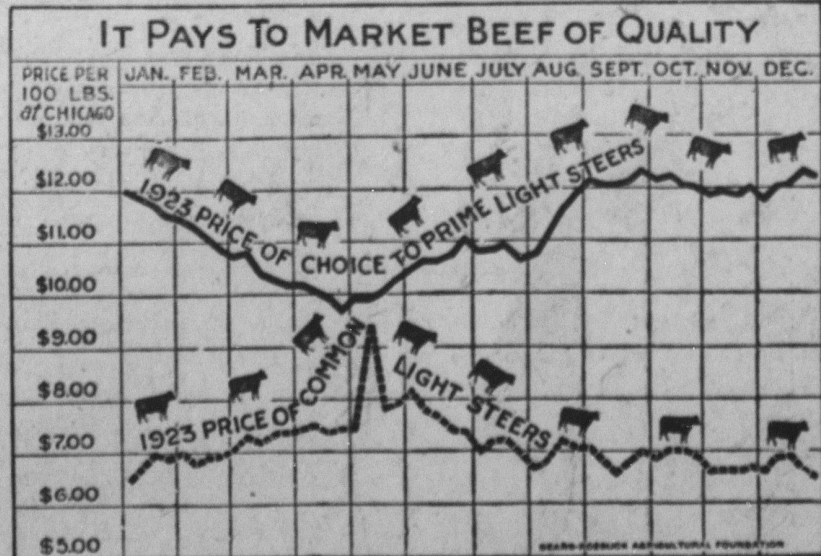
