The Pennsylvania State College Prune for Better Apples-In the bearing apple tree remember that it is the plump, well-nourished bud which produces blossoms and fruit. Secure such buds for next year by a careful thinning out of the ends of the branches which wfff insure plenty of sunlight

Give Rens Room to East-Hens have fairly regular times when they feed. In the morning when they leave the roosts, the whole flock is ready to feed at the mash hoppers. After they have eaten, only a few may come to the hoppers at a time for the next several hours. Then they all seem to get hungry at once and there is another rush for the hoppers. For that reason there should be at least fifteen feet of hopper feeding space per one hund-




