Timely Reminders from
The Pennsylvania State College

Prune for Better Apples—In the bearing apple tree remember that it is the plump, well-nourished bud which produces blossoms and fruit. Secure such buds for next year by a careful thinning out of the ends of the branches which will insure plenty of sunlight and plant food reaching the buds on the remaining twigs.

Buy Ties in Car Lots—There are about four thousand feet of 4-inch ties, or the mixed equivalent, in a car. Get your neighbors to help fill out the car if necessary. Get the Y-branch connections in the car. Use mostly 4-inch ties for branches.

Give Hens Room to East—Hens have fairly regular times when they feed. In the morning when they leave the roosts, the whole flock is ready to feed at the mash hoppers. After they have eaten, only a few may come to the hoppers at a time for the next several hours. Then they all seem to get hungry at once and there is another rush for the hoppers. For that reason there should be at least fifteen feet of hopper feeding space per one hundred hens.

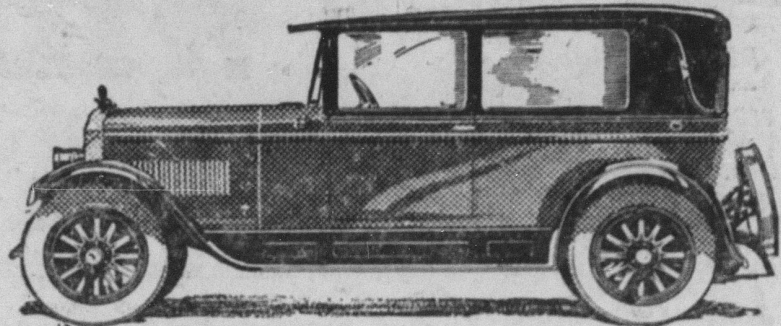

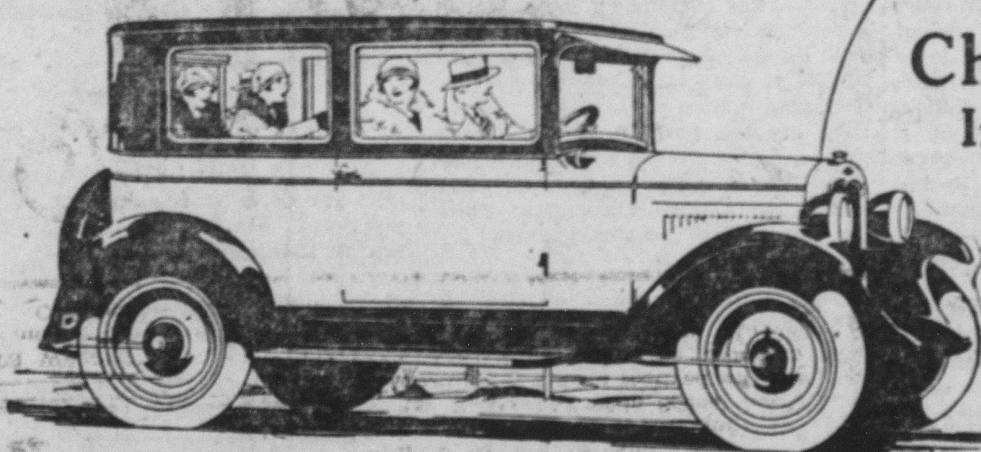
