FARM CALENDAR

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

Prune With Proper Tools—Cutting the firewood with a carpenter's saw is just as sensible as using one to prune the fruit tree. Buy and use a good pruning saw. Efficient tools make it easier to do efficient work. Ninety cents for a pair of hand shears and a dollar and a quarter for a saw is an investment justified even in the home orchard.

Protect the Milk Cow—Dairy cows should be kept under cover on all cold or stormy days. More milk from the same amount of food will result and cows will keep in better condition. Our best dairymen treat their cows right.

Plant Flowers in Hotbed—If a hotbed is available a number of perennials can be started now so that they will bloom next season, landscape gardening specialists of the Penna. State College say. Some of those to be seeded now are columbine, Shasta daisy, larkspur, and single hollyhocks.

Ewes Need Feed and Exercise—During the winter months the breeding ewes need a good ration and plenty of exercise. Fed a good leguminous hay, such as alfalfa, clover, or soybean. Silage or root crops and a little grain complete the ideal ration.

Be Careful With Horse Feeding—Do not feed old Dobbins too much on days when he is standing idle. Astoria, commonly known as the Monday Morning Disease, annually takes its toll in crippled and dead horses on farms where a full ration is fed regardless of the amount of work done.

The Style Forty Years Ago.

When hens were \$3.00 a dozen, rosters 10 c apiece, eggs were 3 doz for 25c; butter, 10c a pound; milk was 5c a quart; the butcher gave away the liver and treated the kids with bologna; the hired girl received two dollars a week and did the washing. Women did not powder and paint (in public), smoke, vote, play poker or shake the shimie.

Men wore whiskers and boots, chewed tobacco, spit on the sidewalks and cursed. Beer was 5c and lunch free. Laborers worked ten hours a day and never went on a strike. No tips were given to waiters and the hat check grater was unknown. A kerosene hanging lamp and a stereoscope in the parlor were luxuries.

No one was ever operated on for appendicitis or bought glands. Microbes were unheard of and folks lived to a good old age.

The building on East Main street, Millheim, that for many years housed what was known as the "marble shop," will be remodeled into a two-story, four-room house by the owner, W. A. Stover.
