Mrs. Harrison was aged 61 years, 7 months and 8 days.

ENTIRE CIRCUS WORKS A MONTH FOR "SPANGLES"

Al G. Barnes Shows Used as Back-ground for Coming Strand Feature.

The longest engagement ever played by a big circus within sight of its permanent winter quarters took place during the filming of "Spangles" the Universal Jewel to be shown at the Richelleu Theatre, Friday and Saturday.

To furnish the setting for this picture, which features Pat O'Malley and Marian Nixon, one of the country's largest circuses, the Al G. Barnes Shows, was taken over entire for a month, and the "big top" was set up near the winter quarters at Culver City, ten miles from Universal City.
