**FARM CALENDAR**

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College

Grow Clean Checks.—Without clean chicks at the start, one cannot expect to be successful in raising healthy birds to maturity, even though every precaution is taken to insure sanitary environment. Chicks should be obtained from selected, disease-free flocks of hens, preferably those tested for bacillary white diarrhea. Heavy mortality is likely to result for the first few days if the parent stock is infected with this disease.

Repair Spray Machines.—The spray machinery should be gone over and carefully inspected. Worn parts should be replaced or at least replacement parts secured. After the sprayer gets into the field, it will be too late to order new valve seats, hose, nozzle discs, etc.

Take Care of Fresh Cow.—Cows about to freshen should be given special care and attention. A mash made with hot water and wheat bran to which a little salt has been added is excellent just before and after freshening. Feed the mash at blood temperature. For at least a day after freshening give only water to drink.

Prepare for Growing Season.—Stakes, trellises, plant supports, and such material for the flower garden should be constructed and painted now.

Important to Health.—Cleanliness, sunlight, fresh air, and disinfectants are important factors in farm sanitation.

Order Seeds Now.—Have you ordered your seeds for spring planting? It will soon be time to use them.
