Grow Clean Chicks,-Without clean hicks at the start, one cannot expect o be successful in raising healthy pirds to maturity, even though every precaution is taken to insure sanitary environment. Chicks should be old ained from selected, disease-free flocks of hens, preferably those tested for bacillary white diarrhea. Heavy mor

Repair Spray Machines-The spray machinery should be gone over and carefully inspected. Worn parts should east of Centre Hall, by W.
