FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

Grow Variety of Vegetables—Have the home garden large enough to produce a 12-month supply of a great variety of vegetables. It should be conveniently located in relation to the farm home. A rectangular shape measuring at least 100 feet in length makes it convenient and economical for cultivating.

Clean the Brooder House—To properly clean a brooder house sweep the ceiling and walls to remove all accumulated dust and dirt, scrape the floors and remove the dirt, scrub the floor and side walls with a powerful disinfectant, and whitewash the interior of the house.

Kill the Corn Borer—Clean culture is necessary in the corn borer infested area if the offender is to meet his deserved doom. This means burning or plowing under completely all corn stalks, stubble, cobs, and trash left in the fields. Corn stalks, cobs, and trash which have not been shredded or ensiled and are located in buildings, stacks, feedlots, barnyards, or elsewhere should be taken out and burned.

Prune Climbing Roses—This is the proper time to prune climbing roses, say Pennsylvania State College landscape architects. Remove all old, hard shoots and preserve the younger ones which are more vigorous and which are the ones that produce the most flowers.

Help Heal Tree Wounds—Wounds on apple and pear trees when two inches across or less will, if properly made, heal satisfactorily without any treatment. For larger wounds cover with grafting wax or white lead and raw linseed oil, darkening it with lampblack if the white is objectionable.

Crop Yields Increase.

A generally rising trend in per acre yields of leading crops over the last forty years in the United States is indicated by a survey concluded recently by the Federal Department of Agriculture. The average yield per acre of corn has increased 18 per cent since 1885; wheat, 17 per cent; oats, 14 per cent; and potatoes, 39 per cent. The total area of the four crops expanded about 52 per cent but the total production has increased 77 per cent.

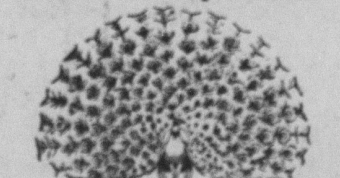
