KELLER.—Mrs. Margaret Keller died from pneumonia after an illness of a week. Interment was made on Saturday afternoon, at Ingram. Mrs. Keller was a daughter of John and Catherine (Keller) Booser and was born in Venango county, March 10, 1851, making her age 76 years and 13 days. The Booser family later moved to the farm about to be vacated by F. V. Jodon, west of town, where Mrs. Keller grew to womanhood. Her husband, Peter Fisher Keller, died two years ago. Four children survive her, namely, William, Philadelphia; Robert and Catharine, at home; Ruth an Rea, both married and living in the Pittsburgh district. John Booser, of Osceola, and D. A. Booser, of Centre Hall, are brothers of the deceased.

ALEXANDER.—After an illness covering a long period of time, Mrs. Sarah Catharine Alexander, wife of Dr. Hugh S. Alexander, passed out of this life at her home in Belleville, on Sunday morning. Mrs. Alexander had been a sufferer from kidney trouble and a few days prior to her death pneumonia developed, which probably was the direct cause of her death. Interment was made Wednesday morning at Belleville.

Beside her husband, who is a Lewistown Hospital patient, she is survived by three sons, namely, Lowell and Elmer, Belleville; and Hugh R., a member of the U. S. Marine, located at Port Au-Prince, Hayti. He is a dentist by profession and holds the rank of lieutenant.

Mrs. Alexander was the daughter of Henry R. and Mary Ann (Moyer) Smith. She was born July 10th, 1857, making her age 69 years, 8 months and 17 days. Michael Smith, Potters Mills; William Smith, Spring Mills, are surviving brothers, and Mrs. D. Geiss Wagner, of Centre Hall, a surviving sister of the deceased.

ROSSMAN.—Josiah C. Rossman, after a long illness, was stricken with apoplexy about two weeks ago and died at his home in Aaronsburg, on Friday. Interment was made at Farmers Mills on Tuesday morning. Rev. Fred Greising, of the Reformed church, and pastor of the deceased, officiating.

Mr. Rossman was a son of John and Elizabeth (Zeliger) Rossman, and was born at Penn Hall, but most of his youth was spent near Penns Cave to where the family moved. Mrs. Rossman, whose maiden name was Miss Mary Ream, and five children survive, namely, Mrs. Harry Corman, Zion; Mrs. Sumner Burd, Aaronsburg; John B. and Elmer C. Bellefonte; and Abner, of Hazelton.

Three brothers survive the deceased: Lewis E., Harvey D., and Howard D., all of Spring Mills.

BOWER.—John Oscar Bower died at Coburn on Sunday evening. He had been ill for several weeks from disorders of the suprarenal capsules, a granular body at the apex of the kidneys. Interment will be made at Aaronsburg this (Thursday) morning. He was born November 13, 1871, making his age 55 years, 4 months, and 6 days. He was a son of Charles and Diana (Musser) Bower, and is survived by his wife, whose maiden name was Miss Sarah Corman, and one or more children.

Mr. Bower, up to the time of his last illness, was employed in the Sheffield Farms Company's plant at Coburn, having previously been with the Coburn Creamery company.

HARRISON.—The remains of Mrs. Jennie Harrison, of Avalon, a suburb of Pittsburgh, were brought to Bellefonte and removed to the Methodist church where Rev. H. E. Knox conducted funeral services. Interment followed in the Union cemetery. Mrs. Harrison, who was the widow of John Harrison, a former Bellefonte school teacher, died after an illness of pleurisy and asthma at the age of 70 years. Mrs. Harrison was born at Pleasant Gap and was a daughter of John and Eliza Barnes, both deceased. She made her home near Pittsburgh with her only daughter, Mrs. Carl Beck. One brother, W. F. Barnes, of Johnstown, and one sister, Mrs. Charles Moore, of Pittsburgh, survive. Mrs. Harrison was a sister of the late H. I. Barnes, of Bellefonte.

THOMAS.—Mrs. Elizabeth Thomas, widow of the late Orlando Thomas, and life-long resident of State College, died of complications incident to advanced years. She was born in Northampton county 32 years ago, and at an early age the family moved to State College where she has resided since. Her maiden name was Elizabeth Fry. Her husband preceded her to the grave about 20 years ago. Surviving are the following children: Grant, of Wyoming; Clyde, at State College; Mrs. Elizabeth Hartswick of State College; and Mrs. W. E. Kline, of Boalsburg. One brother, George Fry, of Petersburg, also survives. Funeral services were held from her late home Friday afternoon, the Rev. W. J. Wagner, pastor of the Lutheran church at Boalsburg, officiating. Interment in the Boalsburg cemetery.
