



COUNTY HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPALS MEET

Decide Examination for High School Entrance Shall Be of Two Parts—Subject Test and Classification Test

The High school principals of Centre county met in the Court House last Saturday at 10 A. M., F. G. Rogers, county superintendent, presiding.

The object of the meeting was to discuss the inequality of present standards required to admit pupils to High schools.

Most High school teachers will admit that the great majority of rural pupils are not scholastically as well prepared as the grade pupils for High school work.

We must first see to it that all have first equality of opportunity; that is, that each shall have an equal chance to attain the same standard.

Reading was especially considered the one subject to be standardized here. How can we hope to solve mathematics if we cannot read intelligently?

Because of the unequal standards existing between graded and ungraded schools it becomes necessary to do a great deal of extra work until the two groups become thoroughly adapted to the course offered.

We find that finally very often the rural pupil leads, showing that his mentality is at par with the others, only he has lacked the equality of opportunity.

County Health Officer Tressel Tells How He Can Be Aided—Prevention of the Slogan.

County Health Officer J. L. Tressel, Bellefonte, writes on "How the Community Can Aid the Health Officer."

"If you were to discover a house afire," asked Mr. Tressel, "what would you do? Would you stand complacently by? Decidedly, you would not."

"Typhoid fever has been eliminated in its epidemic form from communities which have wisely invested in a safe water supply.

"There is a tried old saying that 'an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure' and your health officer will gladly explain its application in the public health problems of your community.

"How can the community aid the health officer? Here is a good way. Find out if you are getting everything of value in your public health program."
