DEATHS

MUSSER—Jacob Franklin Musser passed away at his home in Madisonburg on Friday morning, death having been due to the lingering results of a stroke of paralysis suffered several years ago. Funeral services were held from the home by Rev. W. R. McClellan, and interment made at Farmers Mills. His age was 9 years, 5 months and 7 days.

The deceased was a farmer by occupation, but left the farm east of Centre Hall about ten years ago. He was a son of Elias and Elizabeth (Whiteleather) Musser, a sister, Mrs. Jackson Kline, of Howard, now being the only survivor of that family. The wife of the deceased, who before marriage was Miss Susanna Tibbens, and four children survive, namely, Clarence, Harry, Esther and Carrie, wife of J. A. Eungard.

ALTERS.—Joseph M. Alters, 82 years, veteran of the Civil war, and well known throughout Centre county, died at his home at Bellefonte, Friday afternoon of hardening of the arteries. He had been sick for about six months, his condition becoming serious several weeks ago.

Mr. Alters was born in Spring Mills, the son of Abraham and Rebecca Alters, in 1845. He was married 63 years ago. About 25 years ago Mr. Alters and family lived in Centre Hall.

Surviving are the following children: J. E. Alters, of Altoona; Perry J. and Harry F., of Bellefonte. One brother, William Alters, of Altoona, also survives.

Mr. Alters was buried with military honors, Monday afternoon at 2:30, from the home at Bellefonte.

TREASTER—After an illness extending over a period of nine weeks, Frank Fisher Treaster died at the home of his son, Lester Treaster, near Colver, on Saturday. Funeral services were held Wednesday morning and interment made at Zion Hill cemetery.

The deceased was a son of Jacob and Rebecca (Brown) Treaster, and was born in Potter township. Mrs. Treaster, whose maiden name was Miss Mary Shadow, died several years ago. The son named above is the only surviving child. A sister, Mrs. J. W. Lee, of Bedford, is an only sister.

His age was about 68 years.

WEISER—Ward K. Weiser died at his mother's home in Millheim after an illness of almost three weeks of a complication of diseases. He was a son of Samuel (deceased) and Clara J. (Kantner) Weiser, and was born in Millheim June 5th, 1876, making his age 50 years, 10 months and 27 days.

Surviving him are his mother, Clara J. Weiser, one sister, Bertha, married to Charles Breen, and a brother, Emerson, proprietor of the Weiser Motor Co., the latter two of State College.

He was a member of the Millheim Evangelical church. He belonged to no lodges. He needed none. He was a kindly soul and a character in Millheim who will not soon be forgotten.

BREON.—Mrs. Amelia R. Breon, relict of the late Peter A. Breon, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Wallace Bartges, Millheim, after an illness of several months duration. She was suffering with asthma during the past winter and in her weakened condition was unable to withstand the stroke of paralysis suffered a few days previous to her death.

Deceased was a daughter of William and Rebecca Young and was born in Gregg township May 8, 1852, making her age 74 years, 11 months and 21 days.

She was married to Peter A. Breon, who departed this life eight years ago. There survive her, however, the following children: Ella Breon and Mrs. Gertrude Bartges, of Millheim, and Ammon and Clayburn Breon, both of Lock Haven. (The latter is the husband of Miss Laura Mitterling, formerly of Centre Hall.) Also one sister, Mrs. Lucy Metzger, of Ohio.

She was a member of St. John's Reformed church of Millheim. Interment was made in the Fairview cemetery, Millheim.
