Mrs. Mazie Brouse, of Bellefonte, who was a patient for a week, is also improving.

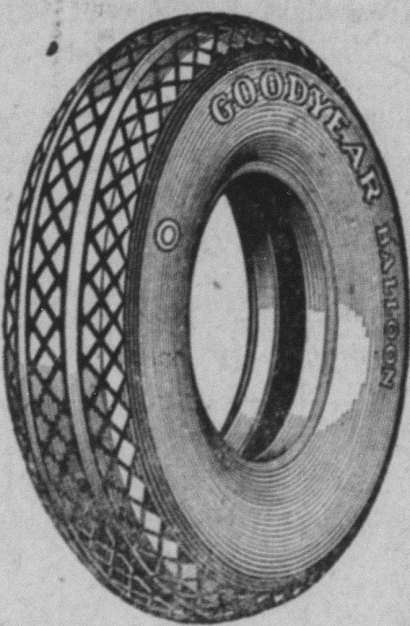

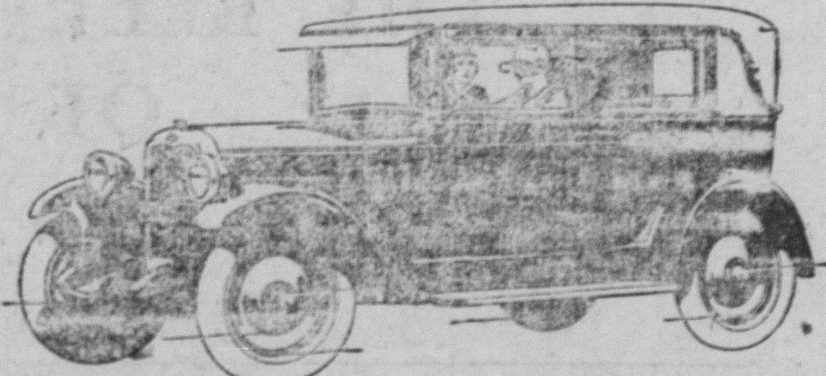
