FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

Chick Care—Prevention of worms in poultry is better than attempting to control them after they have become entrenched. The best method is to follow a strict sanitation program. Raise the chicks in clean houses, with clean litter, use clean feed and water, and let them range only on clean ground.

Use Good Spray—It is better to be safe than sorry, say plant pathologists of the Penna. State College, in recommending that lime sulphur which tests 1.008 be used. Some fruit growers believe that a weaker solution is satisfactory but the specialists say that this is true only in years when there is a poor germination of the apple scab ascospores.

Plant Perennials Now—Many of the old-fashioned perennial flowers may be grown from seed. These may be sown in boxes so that they will be sufficiently large to set out in early September. Most of them will bloom next year.

Improve Dairy Herd—Choose your next herd sire very carefully. No improvement in the herd is possible without bringing in some better blood. If a better herd is wanted in the future something must be done about it now. If you do not understand pedigrees get someone to help make the selection.

Second Liberty Loan Bonds have been called for redemption on November 15, 1927, and will cease to bear interest on that date.

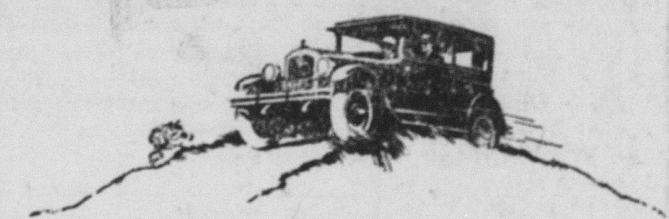
The bonds should be presented on or prior to November 15, 1927. We will be very glad to assist you in effecting the redemption.
