FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

Take Care of the Foal—Special attention is required by the young foal. Keep him in a box stall, darkened for protection from flies. The stall should be clean and well-bedded. A handful of oats, a bucket of fresh water, and some good legume hay for the foal will relieve the strain on the mare. Milk the mare a little when she comes in from work and let her cool off some before the foal gets his meal. Turn both out on pasture at night.

Use Early Variety—If corn for grain must be replanted, use an early variety, say farm crop specialists of the Penna. State College. The ordinary varieties which require the full season in your section will not have time to mature.

Inoculate Soybeans—For the best results, soybeans must be inoculated when grown on soil which has not grown the beans successfully before. Do not plant the beans too deep. One inch of covering is enough. It always is a good plan to fertilize with at least 200 pounds of acid phosphate.

Chicks Like Green Feed—A green feed such as clover or blue grass, should be grown on the chick range. A garden area can be used to fit in with the rotation for chicks. One practical rotation would be corn, clover, chicks.

EXCHANGE OFFERING OF NEW TREASURY BONDS

Notice is given of a new offering of UNITED STATES TREASURY BONDS, dated June 15, 1927, and bearing interest from that date at the rate of 2 1/2 per cent. The bonds will mature in twenty years, but may be called for redemption after sixteen years.

Second Liberty Loan bonds will be accepted in exchange at par. Accrued interest on the Second Liberty bonds offered for exchange will be paid as of June 15, 1927.

Second Liberty Loan bonds have been called for payment on November 15, 1927, and will cease to bear interest on that date. Holders of such bonds who desire to take advantage of the exchange offer should consult their bank or trust company at once. The exchange privilege will be available for a limited period only, and may expire about June 15th.

Air mail letters will bear stamps in honor of the service's pilot who made the epochal flight from New York to Paris.

A special air mail stamp of ten-cent denomination will be issued to commemorate the feat of Captain Charles A. Lindbergh, Postmaster General New announced.

The postoffice department has neither awards or medals nor authority for bestowing decorations with which to mark the appreciation and respect we hold for our air mail pilot, who has

made such a notable contribution to the science of aviation," said Mr. New. "The only appropriate thing we can do is to issue a stamp in his honor."

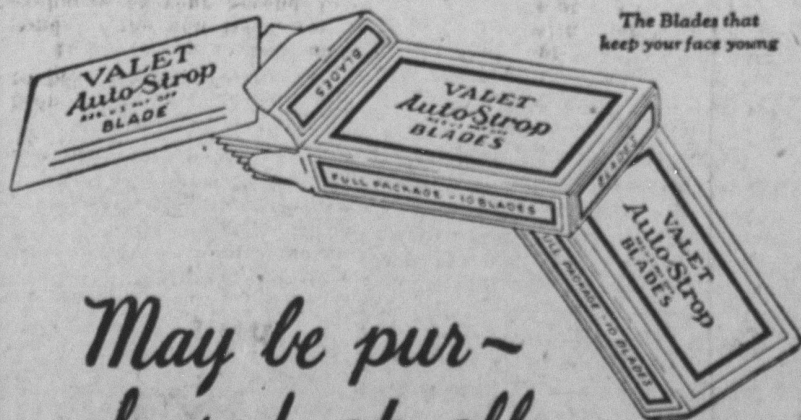

I will gladly answer all questions.

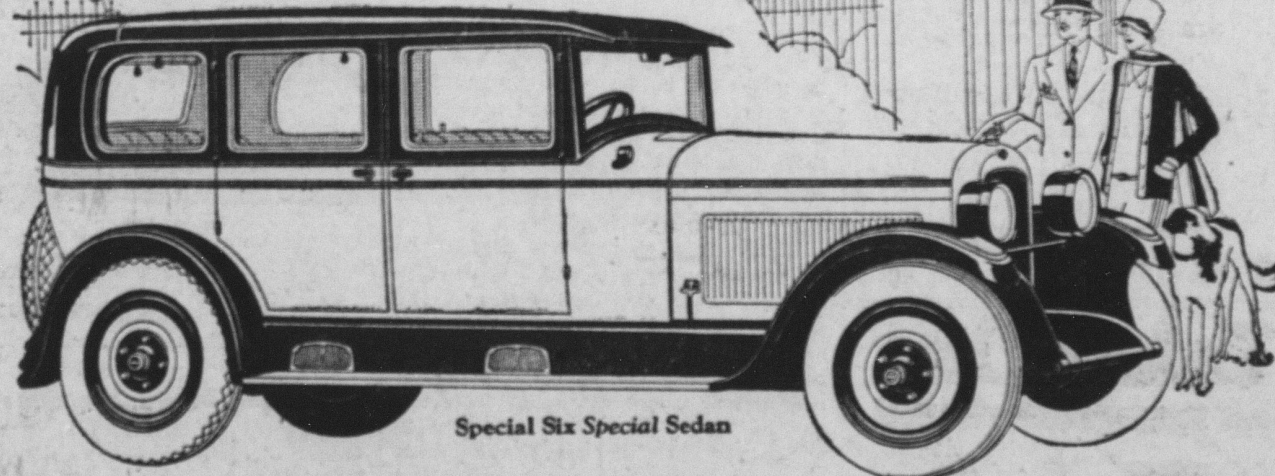
