STATE TROOPERS AT SNOW SHOE

Members of Harrisburg Troop of State Police Sent to Centre County Mining Town for Strike Duty at Request of Sheriff.

The following dispatch was sent out from Bellefonte on Saturday:

Several members of the Harrisburg troop of the State Police arrived today in Snow Shoe where several hundred striking union miners have been endeavoring to persuade non-union men to cease work. The troopers were sent from Harrisburg last night after Sheriff E. R. Taylor declared the situation as "serious," following an investigation yesterday.

The State officers will augment a force of nine or ten deputy sheriffs who have been on the ground for several days. They will remain as long as there is any possibility of a clash between the two groups of workers.
