BROWN.—T. Clayton Brown died at his home on Spring Street, Bellefonte, Monday morning, after an illness extending over a long period. Funeral services will be held this (Thursday) afternoon, the pastor of the Reformed church officiating, assisted by ministers of other denominations.

Mr. Brown was well known throughout Centre county and during the sixty years of his life engaged in various business enterprises. He was a pioneer in the moving picture business in Bellefonte, and for twenty years operated the public on the silver screen in the Scenic Theatre the best obtainable pictures. During the past few years pictures were also shown under his management at the Moose Theatre.
The deceased was a son of Emanuel and Rebecca (Frank) Brown. He is survived by a wife, whose maiden name was Miss Maggie Dawson, and two sisters, namely, Mrs. James A. Feldler, Seattle, Wash., and Mrs. Charles Tabel, Bellefonte.

ADAMS.—Mrs. Anna Elizabeth Adams, wife of Squire J. W. Adams, of South Huntingdon, died at her home on Saturday morning, September 3rd, after a prolonged illness. Mrs. Adams was born at Aaronsburg, Centre county, in 1862, and was united in marriage with Mr. Adams at Millheim in 1886. Fifteen years later they moved to Huntingdon, Mr. Adams at that time taking a position at the Reformatory, and resided there since. Mrs. Adams was a member of the Presbyterian church. She was aged 65 years and 6 months.

Surviving are besides her husband, two daughters—Mrs. R. Allison Miller, and Mrs. Helen Holder, both of Huntingdon, and one grandson, John Robert Holder; also two brothers—Thomas Hull, of Aaronsburg, and D. R. K. The deceased is survived by a wife whose maiden name was Sarah Bowler. The couple were childless.

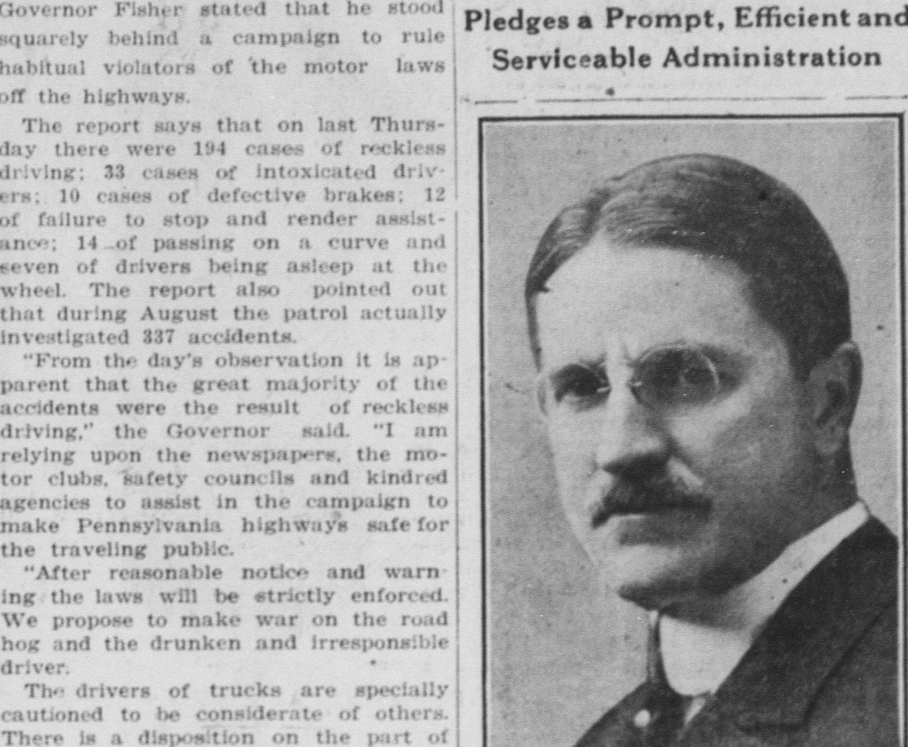
AFTER THE ROAD HOG.

Governor Fisher Finds Most Automobile Accidents Due to Reckless Driving—Truck Drivers Especially Warned to Keep Off Center of Road.

After receiving a one day's survey, Governor Fisher stated that he stood squarely behind a campaign to rule habitual violators of the motor laws off the highways.
The report says that on last Thursday there were 194 cases of reckless driving; 33 cases of intoxicated drivers; 10 cases of defective brakes; 12 of failure to stop and render assistance; 14 of passing on a curve and seven of drivers being asleep at the wheel. The report also pointed out that during August the patrol actually investigated 337 accidents.
"From the day's observation it is apparent that the great majority of the accidents were the result of reckless driving," the Governor said. "I am relying upon the newspapers, the motor clubs, safety councils and kindred agencies to assist in the campaign to make Pennsylvania highways safe for the traveling public."
"After reasonable notice and warning the laws will be strictly enforced. We propose to make war on the road hog and the drunken and irresponsible driver."
The drivers of trucks are specially cautioned to be considerate of others. There is a disposition on the part of many truck drivers to use the middle of the highway, thereby crowding off other drivers. Those who persist in violating the road regulations will have their licenses suspended or revoked.
The Governor also took occasion to pay his compliments to the "road drones" whom he classified as a menace.
