**Bucknell Bequest Valuable.**

Upon his return from Washington, D. C., an official of Bucknell university, revealed that through a land bequest made some time ago the institution may reap millions. The land, which was donated to the school by Dr. James Schwartz, of New York city, is situated across the river from Alexandria, near Washington. A new bridge has been built across the Potomac, and the property is located in the heart of a big development now in progress.

Appraisers conservatively estimated the property at the present time to be worth \$500,000, and B. K. Focht, prominent Lewisburg man, who recently investigated while on a visit to Washington, declares that in his mind the land will be worth \$5,000,000 within a few years.

**\$300,000 Engineering Building.**

Inside the main entrance of the campus of Pennsylvania State College, where nine years ago the main engineering building was destroyed by fire, there will be built a new \$300,000 first unit of a main engineering administration building.

The first floor is to contain a student club room, library and eighteen offices and two draughting rooms. The second floor will contain nine class rooms, a large lecture room and offices. An exhibition room, several offices and six to eight draughting rooms of the department of agriculture will be contained on the third floor.

**Timely Reminders From The Pennsylvania State College.**

**DESTROY BORER IN SWEET CORN**—Sweet corn stalks from which the ears have been picked should not be allowed to stand in the territory infested with the European corn borer. They should be cut and ensiled or shredded if possible. In small gardens they may be cut or pulled, put in a shock in the middle of the patch, and then burned as soon as dry enough.

**EXHIBITING IS VALUABLE**—The man who has never selected fruit and exhibited it at the county fair or farm products show does not know how good or how poor the fruit he raises really is. The cash premiums do not nearly pay for the work, but the educational value is inestimable.

**HELP BIRDS ESCAPE ROUP**—Roup is one of the common fall and winter poultry diseases. It is caused by damp and drafty houses, also by a lack of vitamin A in the ration. Feed vitamin-carrying feeds, like cabbage, grasses, clovers, legume hays, and cod liver oil. Five to ten per cent alfalfa leaf meal in the laying mash or one-half to one per cent of cod liver oil helps to keep the birds healthy and free from roup.

**TAKE CARE OF BORDERS**—Perennial borders should be looked after now and put in good condition, say landscape architects of the Penna. State College. Most plants may be moved with safety after the blooming period is over, and practically any well developed plants may be set out at this time. Roots of phlox, hibiscus, and such plants may be made vigorous and will provide additional plants for the border if the roots are divided. This work should be done now.

**FISHER PROMISES TO CONTINUE HELP TO STATE COLLEGE**

"With You Heart and Soul at Harrisburg," He Tells Faculty and Students.

Pledging his continued aid to the college as his "capstone of public education in the State," Governor Fisher was greeted with enthusiasm by 4000 students and faculty members as he closed his annual inspection of the institution. It was a fitting climax to the opening day of the sixty-ninth year of instruction at the college.

"We're with you heart and soul at Harrisburg," the Governor told his large audience, declaring that it would be his "ambition and pleasure" to see at State College an institution built and planned to accommodate a growing student body. In introducing the

Governor, President Hetzel said that a new attendance record of more than 4000 was in prospect this fall and that through other agencies, the college was reaching approximately 125,000 others throughout the State.

"Through friends and the Legislature you are now in the course of spending \$2,000,000 for buildings," said the Governor, "and with another chance at another Legislature, we are going to see that State College gets a square deal along with other institutions of the State. You have as your president a man who is going to be a great leader and I know you have a profitable year before you."
