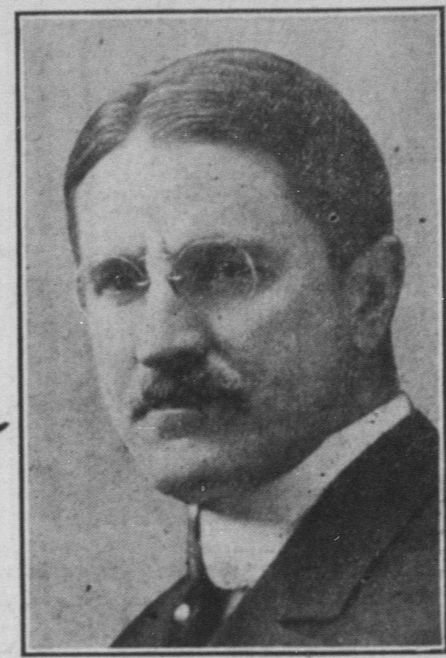
Save Every Ear of Seed Corn. Corn frosted in some parts; situation is critical.

Brief Sketch of the People's Candidate for Judge

W. Harrison Walker, Esq., selected by the Democracy of Centre county over an overwhelming vote, as a candidate for President Judge of this judicial district, is a son of Samuel E. and Amanda Brungart Walker, both now deceased.

Mr. Walker's early training and experience in farm work has always kept him in sympathetic touch with farm problems and intensified in him a deep interest in all agricultural questions and economies.

These qualifications were conspicuously displayed in Mr. Walker's work. Of all the older men in the whole of Pennsylvania it is doubtful if any evidenced as much energy, efficiency, and got relatively as much results for the nation as he did.

It will thus be seen that Mr. Walker does not come from a family of salary takers, and as a matter of fact Mr. Walker has never held a salaried office.

Mr. Walker has been practicing law in this county for more than thirty-one years, and as his practice has been a large one and reasonably lucrative, it has given him a wide experience both in the study and application of legal principles.

At first he appeared frequently in the trial of cases but with increasing caution and experience, and with the open mindedness that came from these to him, he began to realize that it was for the best interests of his clients to settle wherever possible their litigation outside of Courts.

COUNTY COMMISSIONERS IN CONVENTION

Body Favors Continuing of Primary Law—Also Favors \$50,000,000 Road Bond Issue.

A resolution urging the repeal of the direct primary law was voted down when it came up for action at the Convention of Pennsylvania county Commissioners, in session in Harrisburg last week.

The convention went on record in favor of the proposed \$50,000,000 road bond issue, which will be voted on at the next election.
