DEATHS

HARTER.—Calvin M. Harter died at his home in Jacksonville after a lingering illness with a complication of diseases, aged 65 years, 9 months and 3 days. He was a son of David and Lucy Harter and was born in the Jacksonville vicinity on December 25, 1859. Mr. Harter was thrice married, his first wife, Amanda M. Orndorf, and second wife, Bessie M. Harter, having preceded him to the grave a number of years ago. His third wife, who was Annie N. Strunk Clemens, survives, together with three children: Nevin E. Harter, and Earl D. Harter, of Hecla; Mrs. Calvin Young, of Bellefonte. He is also survived by these step-children: Mrs. C. A. Renner, of Altoona, Mrs. C. M. Fry, of Harrisburg; Guy Clemens, of Kansas; Mrs. Allen Harter, of Zion; Roy Clemens and Mrs. Edward Houser, of Bellefonte. In addition the deceased is survived by a sister, Mrs. Samuel Koontz, of Lewistown. Funeral services were held from the home interment in the Jacksonville cemetery.

STERRETT.—John D. Sterrett, aged 73 years, 9 months and 25 days, died at his home in Millroy following a stroke of paralysis which he suffered a few days previous to his death. His health had been declining during the last two or more years.

Mr. Sterrett was born on the old Sterrett homestead farm near Locke Bank, Armagh township, and he followed the occupation of a farmer nearly all his life, until he retired some time ago, making his residence in Millroy.

His wife, whose maiden name was Miss Harriett Gaff of Millroy, preceded him in death about ten years ago. He leaves three sons and one daughter. The daughter, Helen, is the wife of W. Maurice Kelley of Reedsville, the lumberman who has been engaged in lumbering about Centre Hall for a few years. His sons, Andrew G and Hurburt, won much notoriety as baseball players in Mifflin county leagues, Hurburt being later a member of the New York team of the American League.

State Road Work Progressing.
Work on the sections of the State Highway being built at either end of the concrete bridge at Mann's Narrows, near Reedsville, is progressing nicely. Pouring concrete was begun the beginning of the week on the Yeagertown side of the bridge, only half the width of the road being laid at one time to avoid interfering with the traffic as much as possible.

A dispatch from Harrisburg indicates that the connecting link between this road and Electric Avenue, the latter terminating at Burnham, will be constructed next year.

\$72,500 FOR BUSH HOUSE.
The Bush House, Bellefonte, one of the two large hotels in that place, was sold by the Bush estate to William J. Emerick, of Bellefonte, for \$72,500. The hotel is under lease for a two-year period to the present landlord, Mr. Rhineamith. After the expiration of this lease, Mr. Emerick may occupy the hotel himself.

It is the purpose of the new owner to extensively improve the hotel—finish the top floor, install elevators, additional bath rooms, etc., and make it really modern. Mr. Emerick is the owner of the several bus lines running out of Bellefonte and never does things by halves.

A new world's egg laying championship is claimed for Lady Skyline, a single-combed White Leghorn hen, by the Goris Bros., Canon City, Colo. The hen laid her 225th egg in as many days.

Notice is hereby given that every person, excepting Justice of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States (this State, or of any City or incorporated district whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the Legislative, Executive or Judiciary department of the State or the United States or any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the Select or Common Council of any city, of Commissioners of any incorporated district, is, by law, incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any district of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of any such elections shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for except that of an election officer.

Under the law of the Commonwealth for holding elections, the polls shall be open at 7 o'clock A. M. and closed at 7 o'clock P. M.

Specimen Ballot.

To vote a straight party ticket, mark a cross (X) in the square in the **FIRST COLUMN**, opposite the name of the party of your choice.

A cross mark in the square opposite the name of any candidate indicates a vote for that candidate.

To vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, write or paste his or her name in the blank space provided for that purpose. This shall count as a vote either with or without the cross mark.

To vote for an individual candidate of another party after making a mark in the party square, mark a cross (X) opposite his or her name.

For an office where more than one candidate is to be elected, the voter after marking in the party square, may divide his or her vote by marking a cross (X) to the right of each candidate for whom he or she desires to vote.
