Lutheran Synod Missionary Meeting.
The annual convention of the Women's Missionary Society of the Susquehanna Synod of Central Pennsylvania was held at Williamsport last week, and was attended by Mrs. S. F. Greenoak, representing the adult missionary workers; Mrs. W. W. Kerlin, the Young People, and Bettie Ebright, the Light Brigade, all organizations fostered by the Lutheran church.

Mrs. H. C. Bell, general field secretary of the Women's Missionary Society of the United Lutheran Church in America, in the course of one of her addresses under the title of "What Wait We For?" dealt with the aim and scope of the church work and because of the 25,000 miles which she covers annually in her capacity as field secretary, she was well informed to speak on the topic.

She pointed out that the 125 delegates present represented 115 societies and that their assembling together is a symbolical of the whole spirit of missionary work in the United Lutheran church. Extending from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico, from Alaska to Nova Scotia, from Florida to California, the Women's Missionary society of the Lutheran church is, today, a larger body than it ever has been before. The denomination is the first to unite the north and the south, the first to stretch across international boundaries.

Mrs. J. R. Miller, of Millheim, was elected president of the Synodical society at a business session. Other officers elected were: Vice president, Mrs. C. H. Stein, of Lock Haven; recording secretary, Mrs. A. M. Weaver, of Williamsport; statistical secretary, Miss Ollie Woodward, of Nook, and treasurer, Miss Marion Dittm.

Miss Lee at Hospital.
Miss Isabella Lee, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob C. Lee, of Spring Mills, is a patient in the University Hospital, Philadelphia, and is in a very serious condition from what may be an abscess on the brain. Miss Lee, who had been teaching in a High school in morning, New York, has had trouble with her eyes for some time, but the seat of it could not be discovered.

She was taken first by her parents to Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore. The operating surgeon they wished to consult was absent, and then the patient was given in the hands of Dr. Frazier at the University Hospital, Philadelphia.

It appears an operation can not be performed until after the inflammation is reduced, if at all.

Mr. and Mrs. Lee came home on Tuesday evening, but on Wednesday evening returned to the hospital.

LIST OF NOMINATIONS.
The official list of nominations made by the several parties, and as their names will appear upon the ticket to be voted for on the eighth day of November, 1927, at the different voting places in Centre county, as certified to respectively by the Secretary of the Commonwealth are given in the accompanying form of ballot.

Notice is hereby given that every person, excepting Justice of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States or this State, or of any City or incorporated district whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the Legislative, Executive or Judiciary department of the State or the United States or any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the Select or Common Council of any city, of Commissioners of any incorporated district, is, by law, incapable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of judge, inspector or clerk of any district of this Commonwealth, and that no inspector, judge or other officer of any such election shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for except that of an election officer.

Under the law of the Commonwealth for holding elections, the polls shall be open at 7 o'clock A. M. and closed at 7 o'clock P. M.

Specimen Ballot.

To vote a straight party ticket, mark a cross (X) in the square in the FIRST COLUMN, opposite the name of the party of your choice.

A cross mark in the square opposite the name of any candidate indicates a vote for that candidate.

To vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, write or paste his or her name in the blank space provided for that purpose. This shall count as a vote either with or without the cross mark.

To vote for an individual candidate of another party after making a mark in the party square, mark a cross (X) opposite his or her name.

For an office where more than one candidate is to be elected, the voter after marking in the party square, may divide his or her vote by marking a cross (X) to the right of each candidate for whom he or she desires to vote.
