DEATHS

DECKER.—John D. Decker, the oldest office holder in Centre county, and probably in the State, died at his home in Decker Valley, Potter township, Wednesday morning of last week as the result of a general breakdown, though he had been ill only for a brief time.

He was born in Decker Valley, near where he died, ninety-three years ago, and all his long life had been spent in the foothills of the Seven Moun-tains where he farmed the old home-stead. He was a staunch Republican and in 1887 was elected county com-missioner, serving one term of three years, being defeated for the nomina-tion for the second term in 1890 by James B. Strohm. In 1917 Mr. Decker became a candidate for jury com-missioner on the Republican ticket, was successful and was re-elected in 1921 and 1925, hence had served in that office almost ten years. He was an enthusiastic hunter and during his long life had killed upwards of one hundred deer. He was a member of the Reformed church at Tusseyville and a good citizen in every way.

He was twice married, his first wife having been Miss Martha Pfobst and his second Louise Rocky, both of whom preceded him to the grave. Sur-viving him, however, are the follow-ing children: Miss Alice Decker, at home; Ella, wife of B. Franklin Boal, of Peru; Martha, wife of Robert Pier-son, of Altoona; Thomas, of Milroy, and Logan, of Shamokin. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. James Weag-ley, of Spring Mills.

Funeral services were held at the Reformed church at Tusseyville on Saturday morning, and burial made in the Tusseyville cemetery.

DUGAN.—Mrs. Susanna Beck Du-gan, widow of John Dugan, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. B. Frank Detrick, Bellefonte, re-fo-towing a brief illness. For some time past she had been making her home with her son Charles, at Lakemont, Al-toona, but came to Bellefonte on a visit.

Her maiden name was Susanna Beck and she was born in Penna Valley seventy-five years ago. Her husband has been dead a number of years but surviving her are the following chil-dren: Mrs. B. Frank Detrick, Belle-fonte; Edward and Simon Dugan, of Pleasant Gap; Mrs. May Venrick, of Centre Hall; John H. William and Charles D. Dugan, all of Altoona. She also leaves one brother, James Beck, of Penna Cave.

Funeral services were held at the Detrick home and burial in the Belle-fonte Union cemetery.

Jury Commissioner H. W. Frantz. Harry W. Frantz, of near Centre Hall, was appointed jury commissioner to fill the remainder of the term for which the late John D. Decker was elected two years ago. The office will be filled by election two years later. The appointment was made by Judge James C. Furst who saw in Mr. Frantz a man of his party capable to fill the position with credit.

Mr. Frantz was a Republican candi-date for the office of county com-missioner and it was generally con-ceded that he would be nominated, but ten days before the primaries the word was sent out ordering him to be slaughtered, and slaughtered he was.

LIST OF NOMINATIONS.

The official list of nominations made by the several parties, and as their names will appear upon the ticket to be voted for on the eighth day of November, 1927, at the different voting places in Centre county, as certified to respectively by the Secretary of the Commonwealth are given in the accompanying form of ballot. Notice is hereby given that every person, excepting Justice of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States or this State, or of any City or incorporated district whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a sub-ordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the Legislative, Ex-ecutive of Judiciary department of the State or the United States or any city or incorporated district, and also that every member of Congress and of the State Leg-islature, and of the Select or Common Council of any city, of Commissioners of any incorporated district, is, by law, in-capable of holding or exercising at the same time the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or clerk of any district of this Commonwealth, and that no In-spector, Judge or other officer of any such elections shall be eligible to any office to be then voted for except that an election officer. Under the law of the Commonwealth for holding elections, the polls shall be open at 7 o'clock A. M. and closed at 7 o'clock P. M. Specimen Ballot.

To vote a straight party ticket, mark a cross (X) in the square in the FIRST COLUMN, opposite the name of the party of your choice. A cross mark in the square opposite the name of any candidate indicates a vote for that candidate. To vote for a person whose name is not on the ballot, write or paste his or her name in the blank space provided for that purpose. This shall count as a vote either with or without the cross mark. To vote for an individual candidate of another party after making a mark in the party square, mark a cross (X) opposite his or her name. For an office where more than one candidate is to be elected, the voter after marking in the party square, may divide his or her vote by marking a cross (X) to the right of each candidate for whom he or she desires to vote.
