MRS. REED BACK IN COUNTY JAIL

Refused to Pay Tax-Decision of Judge Balley Erallis in Women in Mif-

fin County Avoiding Following Her Course,

Mention was made last week of Mrs. Lillian Reed, of Milroy, going to jail rather than pay tax. Following is a more complete dory covering the affair:

Mrs. Lillian Reed was recommitted to the Mirnin county jaz, 7:15 o'clock. Monday evening, by W. H. Printz. • sheriff, because she refused to pay her tax. The sheriff acted upon a decree issued in the rounty you ty a few days ago by Thomas F. Bailey, president judge.

Sheriff Printz went to the Reed residence in Milroy, early Monday evening and read the court's order to the woman and asked her what choice she would make between two alternatives, one to pay her tax, and the other that of imprisonment in jail. She chose to go to jail.

The sheriff offered to accept approved security that the tax would be paid within ten days, thus giving her the opportunity to enjoy her freedom for that length of time, but she refused to accept this proposition. When the sheriff first went to the Reed home he was thoughful and gave Mrs. Reed an hour's time to select the course which she would choose, before he would take her from her family, and put her behind prison bars. The sheriff left her alone in her home so that she might study her acse, and he returned an hour later to receive her decision, which was that she had de cided to accompany the sheriff to his domicile behind prison walls.

Mrs. Reed accompanied the sherif to the jail. unaccompanied by her husband. She took with her a suit case filled with her clothing and other articles which shemay use in her cell She refuses to make any statement.

Exclusive of her attorney fees, Mrs. Reed refused to pay these items of costs of her case in court. thus far accumulated: Court record costs, \$29. 5; amount of school tax with extra expenses added, \$5.25; sheriff costs \$4.40. Total, \$38.85. Mrs. Reed refused to give any security for the payment of this account charged against her, due to her failure to pay her school tax for one year.

The woman now a prisoner in the woman's ward of the county jail, is the wife of Ralph Reed, of Milroy, who conducts a restaurant in the town.

Z. T. Stine, Lewistown borough tax collector, stated that many women have been paying their taxes since Judge Balley made his decision of the case against Mrs. Reed.


