

Bell Co. Reduces Long Distance Telephone Rates.

A reduction in long distance telephone rates between points separated by 300 miles or more will be put into effect on December 1, according to an announcement by J. H. Cunniff of the Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania. The reduced charges chiefly affect daytime rates, with the greater distances enjoying the greatest reductions and will result in an estimated saving of about \$1,500,000 to long distance users.

These reductions in charges between distant points are introduced to encourage even greater use of the Bell System's nation-wide network of wires and to pass on to the long distance users the economies made possible by recent scientific developments which are chiefly applicable to communication over long distances.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

PENN STATE CABBAGE YIELDS HIGH—North Dakota reports that Penn State strain of Danish Ballhead cabbage outyielded ordinary strains by more than fifty per cent this year. At Pennsylvania State College an acre of Penn State Ballhead produced 23.76 tons which compares well with the average yield of cabbage in the State, nine tons.

CUT AND SELL MINE PROPS—The hard coal mines are showing increased activity as the cool weather nears. They need and use wooden props. Farmers in the vicinity can make good money cutting and hauling props from their woodlands. If proper cutting methods are used, the woods will yield an income in props every winter.

FARMER, GO HUNTING—With the deer season open, take a little vacation and get much needed recreation by spending a few days in the woods. It's only good business to first get a license.

START THE 1928 GARDEN—It will pay well to begin next year's garden right now by applying 15 to 20 tons of manure per acre and plowing this under. Plow as deep as possible without turning up an excessive amount of subsoil. This treatment will improve the physical condition of the soil, increase the amount of organic matter and plant food, and make more plant food available early in the growing season.

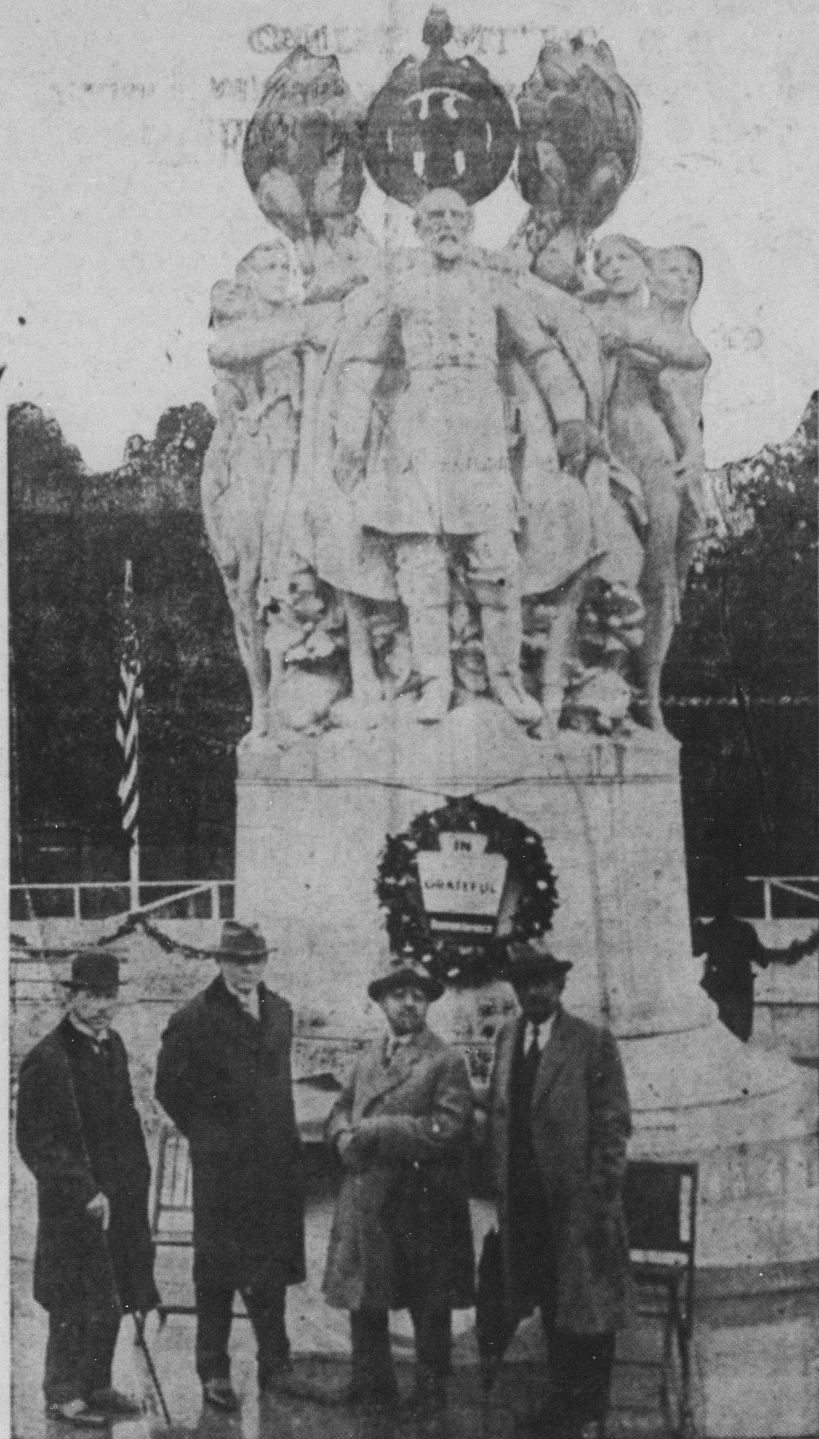
