PRUNE GRAPES FOR FRUIT .-- In pruning grapes remember that the third to the eighth bud will produce better grapes than will the first two buds. On this account pruning to arms of 8 or 10 buds is far superior to the old method of pruning to two buds. Of course where 8 or 10 bud arms are left the number of arms is cut down to a quarter of the number formerly left.
