FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

PRUNE GRAPES FOR FRUIT.—In pruning grapes remember that the third to the eighth bud will produce better grapes than will the first two buds. On this account pruning to arms of 8 or 10 buds is far superior to the old method of pruning to two buds. Of course where 8 or 10 bud arms are left the number of arms is cut down to a quarter of the number formerly left.

SAVE THE CROPS.—See that all market crops that are to be held over winter are protected against freezing and other damage.

KEEP CORN FROM FREEZING.—Is your seed corn properly cured so that it will pass through freezing weather undamaged? It is a valuable commodity on any farm this year and every ear should be saved if possible.

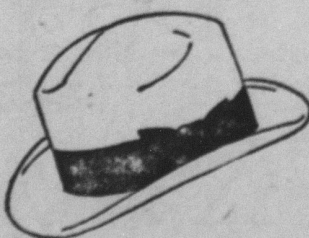
