DEATHS

Miss Isabel Lee Dies at Spring Mills.

After an illness extending over a period of eight weeks, Miss Mary Isabel Lee died at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jacob C. Lee, at Spring Mills, on Tuesday night at ten o'clock. Miss Lee became ill while teaching school at Painted Poets New York State High school, and was first taken to the Sayre hospital, and from there to University hospital, Philadelphia, and Johns Hopkins hospital, Baltimore. The most skilled surgeons in the East examined her and various operations were performed with the hope that relief might be had from what was first thought to be an abscess on the brain, but no favorable results were obtained. The patient was finally brought back home, where death relieved her at the time stated.

Miss Lee would have attained her twenty-fourth birthday in January had she lived. She graduated from the Gregg Township Vocational School and later from Bloomsburg State Normal. She chose teaching as her profession and had entered upon her second year in that work. She was a young woman of high qualities and was honored and respected by her associates during her school life, and later by the community in general. She was a member of the Reformed church, and her pastor, Rev. D. H. Keener, will conduct the funeral services on Saturday morning at 10:00 o'clock. Interment at Spring Mills.

Beside the parents of the deceased named above, the following sisters and brothers survive her: Mrs. David Wachstetter, Bethlehem; Robert, Waverly, Conn.; Eugene, clerk in the First National Bank, Spring Mills; Dorothy, in training for nursing in St. Luke's Hospital, Bethlehem; and Bettie, at home.

SWARTZ.—Elmer E. Swartz died Sunday morning at his home in Pleasant Gap after an illness of some duration due to cancer. He died on his sixty-sixth birthday. Mr. Swartz was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Swartz, both deceased, and was reared on the Swartz homestead east of Pleasant Gap.

The deceased's wife, who before marriage was Miss Sharer, survives him, as do also these children: Mrs. A. T. Breon, Pleasant Gap; Mrs. Boyd Sampel, Bellefonte; Harry Swartz, Juniata; Blaine and Roy Swartz, Pleasant Gap; Mrs. Paul Ross, Madisonburg; and Margaret, at home. These three sisters also survive: Mrs. Elmer Johnston, Altoona; Mrs. C. M. Musser, State College, and Mrs. E. E. Kline, Bellefonte.

During his active life, Mr. Swartz followed the occupation of farming and lived in various sections in Spring township, finally acquiring a farm east of Pleasant Gap where he lived until retiring.

Funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon by Rev. W. J. Wagner, of the Lutheran church, his pastor. Interment was made at Pleasant Gap.

McEWEN.—Mrs. Catherine McEwen, a native of Walker township, died at her home in Lock Haven as the result of general debility, aged 87 years. She is survived by one son, John McEwen, of Lock Haven, two brothers and one sister, James and Morris Meyers, of Avis, and Mrs. Samuel Neff, of Philadelphia. Burial was made in the Hubbersburg cemetery.

BECHTOL.—Mrs. Matilda Snyder, widow of William A. Bechtol, died at her home in Blanchard, aged 85 years. She is survived by two sons and one daughter, Charles Bechtol, of Ouray, Colo.; Edgar T. of Blanchard, and Miss Anna, at home. She also leaves one brother, Thompson A. Snyder, of State College.

WRYE.—Joseph Blair Wrye, in Altoona, aged 70 years. He was born in Half Moon township on a farm, but for many years was employed in the boiler shops of the P. R. R.

CATHERMAN.—Oliver C. Catherman, owner of a general store at Millmont, died very suddenly from a heart attack. He was 65 years old. He is survived by a wife and a son, Rev. Charles Catherman, Gettysburg and a daughter, Mrs. Roy Rudy, of Lewisburg.

MEYER.—William Calvin Meyer, born in Potter township, died in State College. He was a son of George and Anna Fox Meyer. The elder Meyer moved onto a farm north of State College when the subject of this sketch was a boy. Upon his marriage, Mr. Meyer engaged in farming and lived on various farms in Ferguson and College townships, and later purchased the Hartwick farm, two miles south of State College, where he lived until retiring.

The first wife of the deceased was Adeline Krumrine and the second Sarah Ann Smetzer. To this union there are three sons, namely, George C., J. Curtis and Marlon B., all living in State College. The daughter of his first wife was married to Harry Shawley, of State College. She died in April, 1927.

CURRIN.—Funeral services were held Saturday afternoon for D. Scott Currin, former editor and publisher of the Sugar Valley Journal, who died Thursday of heart trouble at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Faith Masters, near Loganton, with whom he resided. Rev. W. L. Kamble had charge of the services which were held first at the home, continuing at the Loganton Evangelical church.

Mr. Currin, who was sixty-one years of age, was a member of the Loganton Evangelical church, and a charter member of Washington Camp, P. O. S. of A. He is survived by his wife, three sons, Lee, of Detroit; Alton and Paul, of Loganton; and by three daughters, Mrs. Masters, with whom he lived; Mrs. Lytle, of Loganton; and Mrs. Sanders, of Williamsport; by one brother, George, of Pittsburgh, and one sister, Mrs. W. A. O'Brien, of Altoona.
