

MISSIONARIES FIND PROPERTY BUT LITTLE DAMAGED

Centers of Revolutionary Disturbance in China Glad to See Missionaries Back.

Two missionaries of the Reformed Church in the United States who have just visited their former mission stations, which they had been forced to leave during the stormy days of the present revolution, were received back cordially. They report in a letter to Rev. Dr. Allen R. Bartholomew, Secretary of the Foreign Mission Board of that denomination.

The missionaries report that "none of the Church property is beyond repair." From Yochow and Huping the missionaries sending the report are Rev. George R. Snyder, of Akron, O., and Rev. Jesse B. Yaukey, of Waynesboro, Pa.

"We were at Yochow ten days," says the report, "and were invited to a feast every day, and some days were out to two of them. The Church members and the people on the street seemed quite glad to see mission folks again, and everywhere they were cordial. We found conditions at Huping in good shape. The buildings are all right, with the exception of a few window panes broken here and there, and a few locks gone, and a few doors damaged. The Chinese committee at Huping has been on the job all the time.

The Girls' School at Yochow was damaged but little.

Timely Reminders From The Pennsylvania State College.

PLAN FARM OPERATIONS—Make a complete plan for the organization and operation of the farm this year. No farm business can be operated successfully without a plan.

GIVE COWS SALT—Salt is needed by all animals that eat vegetable and plant food. The average requirements for cows is about three-fourths of an ounce a day per 1000 pounds live weight and a similar amount for each 20 pounds of milk produced.

FEED POULTRY PROPERLY—Sun-

light, or the lack of it, has a direct effect upon the feeds needed by poultry. Rations that give satisfaction in seasons or climates of ample sunshine may be entirely deficient in rainy or dreary weather.
