

RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION OF CONGRESSMEN

But Small Per Cent. of Members of House and Senate Not Affiliated With Religious Denomination.

(Editor's Note: The Board of Temperance, Prohibition, and Public Morals stands against the possible misreading of the following news item. Only 24 members of the House of Representatives of the United States and four members of the United States Senate are known to have no affiliation with a church. The facts have been ascertained in regard to 18 members of the House and one member of the Senate. Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

MARK LAYING HENS—To determine how many eggs a hen will lay, it is first of all essential to use some identification mark. A numbered leg band is used for this purpose. Each hen has a different numbered band, and it is convenient to letter the bands serially so that a different letter is used each year. Thus, A-101 may be the leg band number of a hen in 1928; B-101 will be the leg band number of a hen hatched in 1929, and so on.

START FARM ACCOUNTS—If you have neglected to get your farm accounts started do it now, say farm management specialists of the Penna. State College. Do not delay.

ALPALPA A RICH FEED—Alfalpa is the most efficient producer of high-class protein. This legume will produce at least fifty per cent more hay per acre than the common clovers.

ORDER VEGETABLE SEEDS—Vegetable growers, whether home garden or commercial, should consider carefully the source, quality and variety of seed to be planted. If you have located a good source, endeavor to get seed of identical parentage for use this year. Send for catalogs of several seedmen, but do not shop around too much. Extravagant, vague statements regarding varieties should be disregarded, but much authentic information may be obtained from reliable seed catalogs.

PENNSYLVANIA DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE BUREAU OF ANIMAL INDUSTRY GENERAL QUARANTINE ON CATTLE

Regulation 1. No cattle shall be imported, or brought in, or allowed to enter the quarantined area except in accordance with the following rules:

Rule 1. Cattle for immediate slaughter may enter the quarantined area to be slaughtered within ten days of such entry, and during this ten-day interval they must be kept separate from other cattle.

Rule 2. Cattle for immediate slaughter may enter the quarantined area to be slaughtered within ten days of such entry, and during this ten-day interval they must be kept separate from other cattle.

Rule 3. Steers, range cattle (a) and semi-range cattle (b) of recognized beef type may enter the quarantined area for feeding and grazing purposes under special quarantine, and confined separate from other cattle on the premises of the owner, or on such other premises as may be designated in the order of special quarantine.

Rule 4. Bull calves under six months old of recognized beef type may enter the quarantined area for feeding and grazing purposes under special quarantine, and castrated within ten (10) days after arrival at point of destination.

Rule 5. All cattle other than those described in Rules 1, 2, 3 and 4 must be subjected to an official tuberculin test before entering within above described quarantine area, and shall be kept separate from other cattle until they have passed a 90 to 100 test.
