MARK LAYING HENS-To deter mine how many eggs a hen will lay it is first of all essential to use som identification mark. A numbered leg band is used for this purpose. Each hen has a different numbered band and it is convenient to letter the bands serially so that a different letter is used each year. Thus, A-101 may be the leg band number of a hen in 1928; B-101 will be the leg band number of a hen hatched in 1929, and so on.

START FARM ACCOUNTS-If you have neglected to get your farm ac-counts started do it now, say farm m nagement specialists of the Penna. State College. Do not delay.

ALFALFA A RICH FEED.—Alfalfa the most efficient producer of high class protein. This legume will prothre at least fifty per cent more nay per acre than the common clovers.

ORDER VEGETABLE SEEDS-Vegetable growers, whether home garden commercial, should consider care fully the source, quality and variety of seed to be planted.
