FARM CALENDAR.

Timely Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.

CORN BORER CAUSES DAMAGE.—Chief injury to corn is done by the European corn borer when it bores into the stalk so that they break over and the ears cannot mature. Serious losses also result because of the reduction in the number and quality of the ears. Clean culture is the best way of keeping the borer under control.

TEST GARDEN SEEDS.—A simple method of mixing a germination test of garden seeds is to count 25, 50, or 100 seeds of the sample to be tested and put them between folds of moist blotting paper. Put the paper between plates and place the apparatus in a warm room. Keep moist but not wet. Count sprouted seeds and note rapidity of germination and vigor of the sprout.

RID HERDS OF BOARDERS.—Fifteen out of every hundred cows tested in Pennsylvania cow testing associations were sold last year. Most of these cows were unprofitable animals. They were boarders failing to pay their board. Does your herd have three cows of every ten supported by the other seven? Testing will answer the question.

START SPRING WORK.—This is a good time to start the spring work by hauling manure on those fields which are not too soft or deeply covered with snow, say farm management specialists of the Pennsylvania State College.
