Unusual interest on the part of Centre county residents will be shown in the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the birth of Dr. Evan Pugh, first president of the Pennsylvania State College.

The "Pugh Centenary" is to be observed next Wednesday evening at 8 o'clock in the chemistry amphitheatre on the college campus, when the college historian, Dr. Erwin W. Runkle, will deliver a memorial address covering the life work and activities of Dr. Pugh. The occasion is sponsored by the Central Pennsylvania Branch of the American Chemical Society, of which Professor R. Adams Dutcher, head of the college department of agricultural and biological chemistry, is president.

Dr. Pugh, in the brief period of five years that he acted as president of the institution, married the former Miss Rebecca Valentine, of Bellefonte, who died only a few years ago. Numerous relatives of that connection and the elder residents of the county who remember Dr. Pugh—few of whom survive—will desire to attend the memorial gathering on February 23.

Following the meeting an exhibit of many personal effects of Dr. Pugh will be shown in the amphitheatre. These will include some of his chemical apparatus, books and letters and photographs, many of them donated to the college by relatives and friends.

**FARM CALENDAR.**

**Reminders from The Pennsylvania State College.**

**PROVIDE FOR BIRDS**—Birds are our greatest garden friends. Shrubs and trees which attract them may be selected for planting on the home grounds. Bird houses and baths can be provided for them that will be ornamental as well as useful.

**UT EDGE ON TOOLS**—A keen cutting edge should be maintained on lawns, wheel-hoe blades, sickles, and all tools used to cut weeds. If they are in bad shape, put them on the grindstone or emery wheel; if they simply "touch up" a whetstone and will answer the purpose.

**UT SUPPLY OF WOOD**—Is the wood supply ready for the coming year? If not, devote this week to firing the job. Those old dead trees are better in the woodpile than lying in the woodlot. Then these spots in nearly every woods where trees removed will be better for the remaining.

**HOW HEALTHY CHICKS**—There are six steps in raising healthy chickens hatching to maturity. They are: 1. Clean houses, clean litter, clean feed, clean management, and 2. Ground or close confinement.

**SEED ALFALFA THIS SPRING**—It is the time to plan for alfalfa seeding. Many Pennsylvania farmers mix alfalfa gradually by mixing small amounts of alfalfa seed with usual clover seeding. In case the alfalfa should fail, thorough lack of alfalfa preparation, this method still produce a crop of hay, say Pennsylvania State College agronomists.

**HOW UNDER CORN BORERS**—In corn borers are plowed under or killed in the process. If there are remnants left on the surface, over the borers die from exposure to enemies which they return to the top of the ground.

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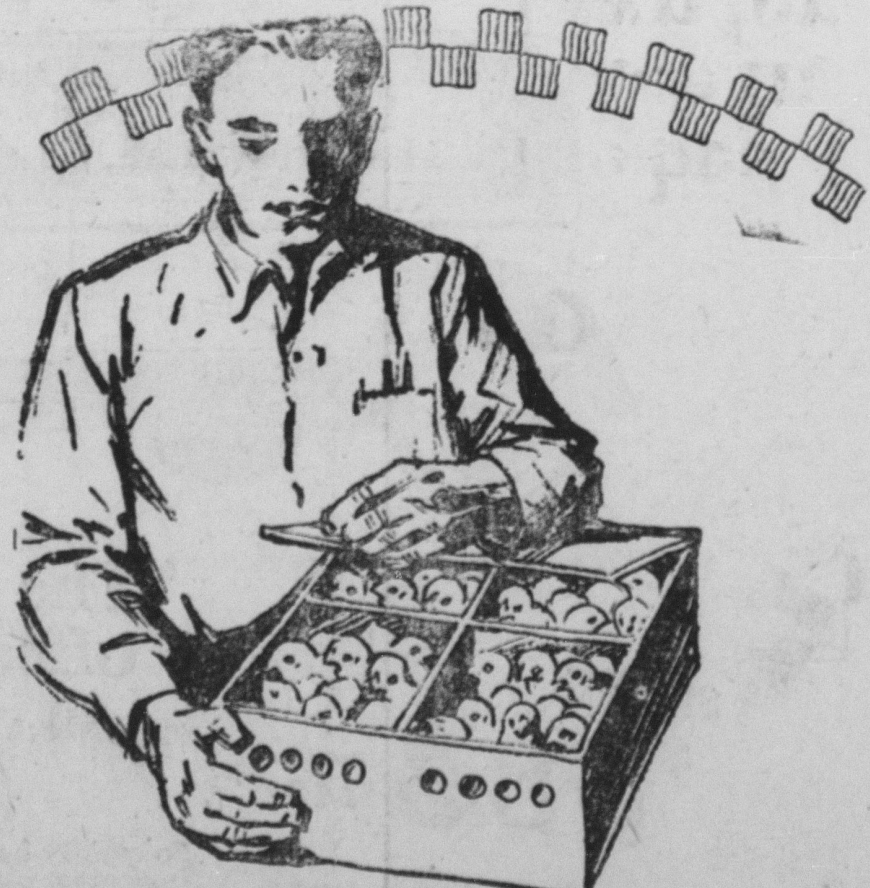
